

EXTRA MEET OF CONGRESS SEEMS NEAR

Night Sessions Threaten
Senators Delaying to
Act With Speed

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (UP).—Prospects for a forced extra session of congress were enhanced today by the Lucas-Norris controversy, the railroad consolidation plan, and other holiday developments, but the administration men still apparently were confident of forcing action on the necessary appropriation bills. Likelihood was seen that the Hoover cabinet in the senate would inaugurate night sessions soon after congress meets Monday if the senate shows a tendency to delay action. Such action would turn the senate, termed a "debating society" by its critics, into an endgame contest, and it is unlikely that the 36 members, most of them in their sixties, would be able to retain their health through two months of 10 to 15-hour days.

FARTHS SPLIT
So far the extra session advocates are confined to a minority of each party in the senate. Senator Joseph T. Robinson, Ark., and Rep. John N. Garner, Tex., the minority party leaders, both are opposed to a special session. As are President Hoover and all the administration Republicans. Senators T. H. Caraway, Democrat, Ark., and Smith W. Brookhart, Republican, Ia., have joined in the outspoken advocacy of a special session started by Senator William E. Borah, Republican, Idaho.

ASKS RESIGNATIONS
Caraway commented today that senators who believe congress hurls business should resign from that body. Several highly controversial "holiday" issues are expected to take up the first week of the remaining two months of the short session. The power commission fight resulting from the new commissioners' action in discharging a solicitor and a chief accountant is expected to start Monday with a move to consider the confirmation of the members. Senator James Couzens, Republican, Mich., and Senator Brookhart are aroused over the new four-system eastern consolidation plan and President Hoover's part in bringing the rail chiefs into agreement.

The attack on Senator George W. Norris, Republican, Neb., by Executive Director Robert H. Lucas of the Republican national committee is expected to be aired on the senate floor, and the Nye campaign inquiry committee intends to delve further into the Republican election funds and their expenditure.

A move to reconsider the vote by which the senate passed a \$10,000,000 bill for modernization of three battleships under the London treaty is scheduled to come up for a vote. Senator John J. Blaine, Republican, Wisconsin, is seeking to amend the treasury appropriation bill to restrict the postmaster-general in leasing private buildings for public use.

It will be the task of Senator Watson and Speaker Nicholas Longworth to force past this jam the 11 necessary appropriation bills, making available the four billion dollars needed to run the government in the fiscal year. If two or three of them are not finally enacted, President Hoover will be forced to call a special session of the new seventy-second congress sometime before July 1.

Judge Considers Fook's Fate as Hearing Closes

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 2 (UP).—Final arguments in the preliminary hearing of Leo Fook, aged Chinese servant, on a charge of strangling to death his mistress, Mrs. Rosetta Baker, wealthy club woman and actress, were concluded today.

Municipal Judge Sylvain J. Lucius said he would give his ruling next week, adding that he hoped to have it ready by Wednesday.

"All evidence points to Fook's guilt," Assistant District Attorney Peter J. Mullins claimed in his closing argument.

"There is not a single bit of evidence linking Fook with the crime," William J. Gloria, defense attorney, responded. "He is the victim of circumstantial evidence planted by others than the police."

Just before final arguments were started police brought in a surprise witness, Mrs. Elizabeth Adele Karpe, who testified that when she went to work as a housekeeper for Mrs. Baker last March the Chinese houseboy told her Mrs. Baker was "no good."

Defense then called Mrs. Dolores James, also a former housekeeper for Mrs. Baker, and she testified that Leo was at all times a faithful servant and appeared fond of his mistress.

STOCKS SHOW BEST GAIN IN MANY MONTHS

NEW YORK, Jan. 2 (UP).—The first day of the New Year on the stock exchange witnessed one of the best gains since early October. Trading pace quickened slightly with turnover at 2,031,350 shares, against 1,935,250 shares on Wednesday.

Rising tendencies were not in order all day. The market opened firm, sold off sharply until early afternoon when it definitely turned higher and held the majority of gains to the close.

The impetus to the buying was a radical downward readjustment in credit conditions. Call money rates renewed at 3 per cent and then dropped to 2 and finally to 1 1/2 per cent where they closed the week. Call money was available outside the stock exchange as low as 1 1/4 per cent.

United States steel was the leader of the industrial group, rising to 142 up 2 1/2 where it closed. Other industrial shares made corresponding gains. The motor department gave another demonstration for the automobile show which opens here on Saturday. Auburn soared nearly 6 points and held 4. Substantial gains also were made by Nash, General Motors, Studebaker, Hudson and Hupp.

REVOLT IN PANAMA WINS

yer, and Francisco Arias, wealthy businessman. They took over the functions of administration, ending the 16-hour revolt. The city was quiet tonight. A protest guard remained at the United States legation.

SOLDIERS ON GUARD
American soldiers with fixed bayonets guarded the Canal Zone boundary line. They warned Americans not to enter Panama City. The interior was quiet. Most of the towns controlled by revolutionary forces were expected to capitulate promptly on advice that the revolt had succeeded.

Youthful members of the communal association for better government directed the revolution. Eight persons were killed and several others, including an American newspaper correspondent, were wounded. The toll included two civilians and six policemen dead and 15 injured.

OVERTHROW "BOSS RULE"
The American was Hartwell Ayers, former correspondent for the New York Sun. He fell with bullet wounds in the neck, hip and abdomen. He is a brother of the publisher of the Aniston, Ala. Star.

The communal association demanded the overthrow of the "boss rule" of Rodolfo Chiari, former president and leader of the liberal party to which Arosemena belongs. Chiari, finding himself isolated, fled to the Canal Zone for safety.

CLASH IN BRIEF
The revolution began before dawn. The rebel forces proceeded to the presidential palace, where a brief clash took place. The police defending the palace fired at the advancing revolutionary mob. There was an exchange of heavy rifle fire and the small police contingent was overcome. Panama has no army. Arosemena was taken prisoner and held under guard in the palace. He was not injured. The popularity of the rebellion forced Arosemena to sign his resignation a few hours later.

PROMISES REFORM
Dr. Arias issued a statement. He promised immediate reform of the election laws to prevent the perpetuation of any administration and to end "mismanagement and graft" in the government. These were two of the chief accusations that caused the uprising.

The streets around the palace were deserted and quiet. The early morning calm was broken only by the sporadic bursts of rifle fire. The police occasionally used their machine guns but fired into the air.

LEADER IN JAIL
The young rebels straggled to a position a block from the palace, then lined up in the shelter of the Chase National bank. The fighting spread to the Central and Sabana police stations. Telephone and cable communications were cut.

The United States minister, Roy T. Davis, conferred with the revolutionary leaders. He issued a statement declaring that no American troops would be called in unless disorder broke out again.

Ayers was operated on at the Gorgas hospital in an effort to save his life. His recovery was exceedingly doubtful. Chiari, political leader against whom the rebels were most bitter, fled but subsequently surrendered voluntarily. He was placed in jail by the junta authorities.

Panama Minister Ricardo J. Alfaro to his country to assume the presidency, it was announced at the legation.

Legation officials said Dr. Alfaro would unquestionably respond to the call.

This action followed resignation of President Arosemena today following a successful revolutionary movement in the Panamanian capital, Panama City, headed by a group characterized here as representative of elements opposing the policies of former President Rodolfo Chiari. The court ruled unconstitutional the election held last October. Voiding the elections automatically would continue Dr. Alfaro in office as vice-president and first designate.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (UP).—Dr. Ricardo J. Alfaro, minister of Panama, who was called late today by the president of the supreme court of that republic to return and assume the constitutional presidency following today's revolution, tonight accepted the call. Legation officials told the United Press that no time had yet been set for the minister's departure. Earlier reports that Dr. Alfaro would start for Panama City immediately by airplane were denied.

Quell Mutiny Of Prisoners In Seattle Jail
SEATTLE, Jan. 2 (UP).—James Aronson, John Hjelmer and T. H. Johnson, named as the three ringleaders of a mutiny among prisoners in the county jail here, were placed in "solitary" today, and order was gradually restored.

One hundred prisoners comprised a group which refused to emerge from their cell for the usual exercise yesterday, but the majority of them quelled down during the day. The attempted rebellion ended.

CITY TAKES OVER OLD CEMETERY

Linkville Cemetery Plotted; Improvements in Appearance

A plot of the Linkville cemetery has been completed by the city engineer's office and will soon be filed in the office of the county clerk. It was announced last night. The city will take over the management of the cemetery within a few days.

The location of present graves and sites for new graves have been plotted on the map, as well as several new roads which will be constructed in the cemetery.

UNMARKED GRAVES
There are, however, a number of old graves which are unmarked and anyone knowing the location of one is asked to call the city engineer's office.

J. E. Van Camp, councilman for the fifth ward, started the action to have the city take over the management of the cemetery, and C. C. Keller, city engineer, and E. A. Thomas, assistant engineer, have been working on the plot for the past three months.

TO IMPROVE LOOKS
It is now ready for the signatures of the mayor and police judge and as soon as it is filed, undertakers of the city will be informed not to sell any more graves.

Although the land was donated to Linkville Falls many years ago, this is the first time that city officials have managed the cemetery. Plans are being made to improve its appearance by planting trees and doing some landscape work this spring. Additional water lines and other conveniences will also be installed.

Lingle Assassin Believed Held By Chicago Cops

CHICAGO, Jan. 2 (UP).—Seven months' investigation at a cost of possibly \$100,000, has resulted in the arrest of a left-handed gunman who authorities believe assassinated Alfred J. Lingle, Chicago Tribune reporter, it became known today.

Leo Loeffler, the suspect, like the notorious Fred Burke, is a former member of "Egan's Rats" gang of St. Louis. He was taken into custody 15 days ago after a tip given by a member of "Egan's Rats" gang that he had been carefully checked.

To avoid "interferences," Loeffler has been held in a suite in the Congress hotel by orders of Pat Roche, chief investigator for the state's attorney.

Throughout the questioning Loeffler has maintained his innocence. But it is known that his movements on the day of June 9, when Lingle was shot down from behind in a Michigan boulevard tunnel, have not been explained satisfactorily.

Likewise several witnesses of the escaping murderer are understood to have tentatively identified Loeffler as the fleeing gunman.

VISITORS TO LAKE INCREASE

Past Year Exceeds All
Previous Years by
Large Margin

Figures released from the Crater National forest headquarters at Medford show that there were 275,321 visitors in the forest during 1930, a considerable increase over records of the previous year. Of this number, 157,693 passed through en route to the Crater Lake National park, recording the largest number of visitors in the history of the park. Thousands of the visitors in the forest were tourists attracted by the nationwide reports of the great outdoors of the Southern Oregon section, with its fishing and hunting.

The visitors are classified as follows: Special use permittees and guests, 1116; hotel and resort guests, 15,365; campers, 12,100; picnickers, 10,750; transient motorists, 256,094. The number of visitors by mode of transportation are as follows: Auto exclusive of stage lines, 227,500; stage line, 2000; hikers, 426; wagons and horses, 405.

The different reports attracted visitors as follows: Lake of the Woods, 3750; Fish Lake, 7200; Dead Indian Lake, 1275; all others in Dead Indian section, 2300; Klamath district, 1350; highway to south entrance of Crater Lake park, 62,185; west park entrance, 33,500; all others in Klamath district, 400; Union Creek, 12,075; Huckleberry mountain, 2300; Crater Lake Highway in Rogue river district, 79,151; Diamond lake road, 10,000; all others in Rogue river district, 2226; Applegate, 5550.
