Rabid Coyote Kills Sheep in Modoc County

ALTURAS (Modoc Co.), Jan. 2.—That the death of several sheep on the ranch of J. F. Bunker and Son of Willow Ranch recently was caused by rabies is proven by reports of officers of the state hygienic laboratory who examined the brains of the animals.

Several cases were reported throughout the county last summer, causing some uneasiness to local farmers. About 15 years ago an epidemic of the disease swept through the county, causing a livestock loss of many thousands of dollars. During this epidemic, in which two human lives were lost, coyotes and wildcats afflicted with the disease came boldly into towns and farmyards.

In the recent outbreak on the Bunker ranch the sheep were bitten by a rabid coyote.

States comes from the two Pacific northwest states, while an even greater percentage of other berries come from this section.

"THE NEW and rapidly growing industry adds great promise of future development," the report stated in regard to the frozen berry method. "The rapid expansion of cold pack business in berries offers evidence that these products carry approval of the trade. A continued growth of the industry is confidently expected."

THE STUDY also deals with price and production trends and future markets and crop predictions. All branches of marketing channels including canning, cold pack, drying and fresh market shipments are considered. The report is in manuscript form at present but will be available in bulletin form in the near future.

ST. HELENS (UP)—Austrian winter field peas, of which a considerable acreage now is being grown in Columbia county, were tried out by the Oregon experiment station and by various farmers and found satisfactory as a crop, according to George Nelson, county agent. This crop is being used to replace vetch and oats to a limited extent, as the yield is now from 10 to 20 per cent higher.

HILLSBORO (UP)—Close culling of poultry flocks and increased use of home-grown feeds is recommended by W. S. Averill, assistant Washington county agent. In this manner only can the present slump in poultry product prices be met, he said.

CUTTING down on feed for the laying flock is false economy, Averill warned, as birds fed scant rations become starboarders without a chance to pay their way. By using home-grown feeds at present farm prices, poultry feeds can be obtained much cheaper now than in the past, he pointed out, and will be more nearly in line with present egg prices.

IN MIXING these feeds, barley, preferably Hanchuan, may be substituted for at least half the corn, according to Averill. He claimed, however, that inclusion of some meat meal, fish meal, bone meal or oil is necessary to provide the flock with proper amounts of digestible nutrients.

Guard U. S. Mint Following 'Tip' Of Bandit Raid

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 2 (UP)—An extra guard was placed in the United States mint building here tonight following a "tip" to Capt. Thomas B. Foster, chief of the secret service here, that a raid on the building was being plotted by bandits.

"We get these tips right along," Capt. Foster said, "and usually don't amount to anything. We have to be careful, however, and that's why I am taking precautions."

G. N. EMPIRE BUILDER ON FASTER TIME

Schedule Reduced Again By Great Northern; Is Sixth Cut

Another reduction in the running time of the Great Northern's Empire Builder and Oriental Limited went into effect Sunday, according to C. N. Christopherson, general agent here.

The Empire Builder will slip 45 minutes from its eastbound and 30 minutes from its westbound running time. The changes affect the arrival and departure hours at only the eastern terminals, the eastbound train arriving in Chicago at 8:45 a. m., instead of 9:30 a. m. at present, and the westbound train leaving Chicago at 10:45 o'clock at night, 30 minutes later than at present.

The eastbound Oriental Limited will be speeded up, arriving at St. Paul an hour and a half earlier at night, at 8:30, instead of 10 o'clock.

This is the sixth cut in running time made since the Empire Builder was placed in service, a year and a half ago. More than 12 hours has been cut from the transcontinental schedule by the Great Northern since that time. Mr. Christopherson emphasized the fact that the Great Northern is not participating in a "speed war" and said that the purpose in making the initial drastic time reduction was to save a business day for travelers at both the east and the west terminals, by providing evening departure and morning arrival hours. The first cut was approximately five hours. The ease with which the Great Northern was able to maintain the new fast schedules, on account of its short route and many grades, encouraged the railroad's officials gradually to make the morning arrival hours still earlier in the day and the evening departure hours still later at night.

SHORTEN SCHEDULE This policy resulted in numerous schedule shortenings. In the way of "refinements" for the convenience of the traveling public, and the new schedules, Mr. Christopherson said, the probably as ideal as can be achieved, the westbound Empire Builder leaving Chicago at 10:45 at night, St. Paul at 8:50 next morning, arriving at Spokane at 9:30 p. m., the following night, and in Portland at 7:45 the next morning, (Seattle 8 a. m.).

Eastbound the Empire Builder leaves Portland and Seattle at 9:30 p. m., Spokane at 7:45 the following morning, arriving in St. Paul at 10:30 the next night, and in Chicago at 8:45 the following morning.

Ask Receiver For Yreka Road, Holding Company

YREKA, Calif., Jan. 2 (UP)—Hearing on the application to appoint a receiver for the Yreka railroad and the Klamath River Holding company, was continued until January 16, in superior court today.

William V. Cowan, attorney for Perkins and Churchill, the Yreka Lumber company and the Klamath Publishing company, who brought the action, filed an application for a new restraining order.
