

OFFICERS BACK FROM MEETING

County Officials Highly Complimented For Cooperation

Seventy-five law enforcement officers attended the meeting of the association held in Klamath Falls, Saturday, according to T. R. Gillenwater, president.

Law enforcement officers of Klamath county were highly complimented by George Neuner, United States District Attorney, for the cooperation they have given the federal government in the past two years.

L. D. Arnold, superintendent of the Klamath Indian Reservation, addressed the law enforcement officers, asking support of the association in recommending re-appointment of the Indian agent, some of the original liquor laws pertaining to Indians.

Fred R. Goddard, county judge of Klamath county, expressed views of the county court in regard to co-operation with law enforcement officials, assuring them that he would assist in support toward any move that would increase efficiency of the law enforcement program.

T. R. Gillenwater, outgoing president of the association, summarized work of the organization for the past year relative to matters of establishing identification bureaus in small localities, and spoke at length of the cooperation existing among all law enforcement agencies in southern Oregon as a result of the activities of the organization.

Gillenwater will be succeeded as president of the organization by Ralph Jennings, sheriff of Jackson county. William Walsh, newly appointed district attorney of Coos county, was elected vice president and V. F. Jackson, sheriff of Douglas county, secretary and treasurer.

Other important talks and addresses on the program of Saturday's meeting were given by Harris Ellsworth, former secretary of the Oregon State Editorial Association, chief of police L. O. Jenkins, head of the Portland police department, George Neuner, United States District Attorney, and Guy Gordon, district attorney of Douglas county.

The next meeting of the association will be held in Coquille, Ore., sometime in February.

Guatemala's Third Government—In a Week



Significant figures and scenes in the bloody course of Guatemala's government are shown in these first pictures to reach the United States. The present chief executive, General Manuel Orellana, is seen in the upper picture, right center, with his staff. Miguel T. Alvarez, lower left, new minister of government and justice, and Dr. Carlos Padilla y Padilla, lower right, were leaders in the movement which resulted in a bloody coup d'état and the establishment of Orellana as the third president of the Central American republic within one week. When President Lazaro Chacon resigned because of illness, he was succeeded by Haudillo Palma, who was recognized by the U. S. Four days later, however, General Orellana, supported by troops, ousted Palma during fighting in which 57 persons were killed or wounded. One of those slain was General Mauro de Leon, minister of war, and the center picture shows the crowd that attended his funeral at Guatemala City.
