SALEM, Ore., Jan. 6. (UPI)—Oregon county judges will attempt to amend the county high school transportation law.

A COMMITTEE headed by Judge V. P. Moses will meet with county superintendents within a few days, to draft changes in a bill to be presented to the 1931 legislature.

"WE DO NOT intend to propose any drastic alterations," Judge Moses said, "but rather to adjust existing conditions."

"UNDER the present situation, school taxes have right of way above all other taxes, and road funds can be called upon to help pay for school bus transportation, if necessary," the judge explained.

"WE WANT to save all the road money possible, and it is with this in mind that the committee will work, to put a curb, if possible, on the kind of school allotment of taxes," Judge Moses said.

Ernest Wallin and Rainford Newhouse, two Ashland youths who accompanied the Crater Lake council Boy Scouts, Medford, to Lake of the Woods on their winter camping party, December 22, and suffered frozen feet, have been removed to their homes in Ashland.

When the boys left here it was evident that they were both improved. The Newhouse boy's feet were still in a serious condition, and physicians thought they might have to amputate his little toe.

Contrary to general opinion, the boys were not in any way connected with the local council of Boy Scouts, who originally intended to go to Lake of the Woods, but abandoned the idea when the weather grew more severe, and went to the Big Lakes camp.

Snow Falls At Big Pines For Winter Sports

BIG PINES, Calif., Jan. 6. (UPI)—The first snowfall sufficient for winter sports was falling here tonight, assuring a busy time at the country recreation park.

The snow began falling at 6 p. m., and there were six inches of white covering the ground at 8:30 p. m. Eight toboggan slides and three ski jumps, including one 1145 feet long, the longest in the world—will be put in use tomorrow. Big Pines is 91 miles from Los Angeles.

1350 Cars of Klamath Spuds Go to Markets

An official check on potato shipments up to January 1, shows a total of 1350 cars shipped to foreign markets from Klamath county, according to C. A. Henderson, county agricultural agent.

Out of the total shipments, 1234 cars went by rail and the remainder by truck.

The total shipments to date represent a little more than two-thirds of the entire potato crop for 1930. The remainder of the crop is being shipped out at the rate of from eight to 10 cars daily, and a considerable portion of the entire crop still remains in storage.

Talks on 'Four Biggest Fools in Klamath Falls'

A large audience heard the Kellem Brothers, evangelists, at the First Christian church last night.

Following a congregational song service under the direction of Evangelist Homer Kellem, and a beautiful solo, "The Old-Fashioned Faith," sung by his wife, Dr. Jesse R. Kellem delivered a sermon on "The Four Biggest Fools of Klamath Falls."

"The Bible is the best mirror in all the world," said he in his introduction. "Every man can look therein and see himself. And the Bible is absolutely unsparring in its treatment of sin," he continued. "If a man lies, he is called a liar; if he steals, he is called a thief; if he commits adultery, he is called an adulterer; and if he lives a life of folly, he is very plainly called a fool."

"Bible Fools are merely types of fools in Klamath Falls today," he said. "There are those we might call dare-devil fools; like Abner of old, they knowingly place themselves in the hands of their enemy and perish right at the door of safety. Then there are those who can well be called fools, because like Ananias and his wife, they try to play the double game, and by so doing, they lose. And there are those who are called fools, because like Judas, they thought they could get along without God, well represents those in Klamath Falls who might call themselves fools; and then there are those, like the right young ruler, who prepare only for the here and now and make no preparation for the future. God said, 'Thou fool, this night is thy soul required of thee, and the things which thou has prepared—whose shall they be?'

Tonight at 7:30, another revival will be held.

A feature of tonight's service will be the drawing of a colored chalk picture by Mrs. Homer Kellem to illustrate some song. Dr. Kellem's subject for tonight is the interesting question, "Does it make any difference what a man believes in these modern times?"

KLAMATH HAS STATE LEAD IN PHONE GROWTH

Indicates General Growth Of Entire District; Now Have 3,699

With a gain of 239 telephones, the Klamath Falls Exchange of the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company led all other exchanges of the company in Oregon except Portland, in increase in telephones during 1930, according to an announcement made by A. G. Goehring, manager for the company here. The total number of telephones in Klamath Falls now is 3,699.

In percentage of gain the increase in the number of telephones in Klamath Falls was far ahead of any of the other large exchanges in Oregon including Portland. Only one small exchange, Seaside, had a larger percentage of gain than Klamath Falls.

EVIDENCES GROWTH
"This is definite evidence that Klamath Falls is one of the fastest growing cities in Oregon," declared Mr. Goehring. "And we see no reason why this city should not continue to forge ahead in 1931."

"To take care of this additional growth two new sections of switchboard equipment will be installed in the Klamath Falls telephone office this year," Mr. Goehring said. These are to cost in the neighborhood of \$15,000.00.

HAVE 40 EMPLOYEES
Additional construction work of routine nature will bring the expenditures of the company for additions and new construction in Klamath Falls this year up to approximately \$20,000.00. This figure it was pointed out does not include the day to day expenses and cost for providing telephone service for this district.

"Klamath Falls now has 40 telephone employees," Mr. Goehring said.

Annual Dairy Dinner Planned For This Month

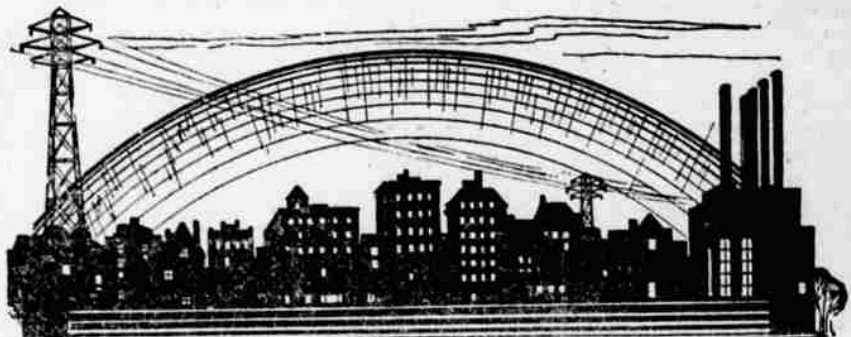

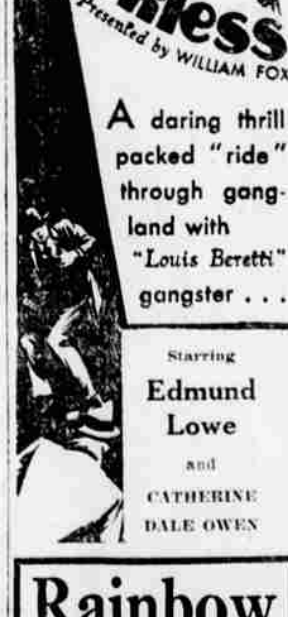
