State's Mining Falls Off Last Year by Report

SALEM, Jan. 7. (UP)—Metals from lode and placer mines in Oregon during 1930 totaled \$395,100, a decrease of \$176,300 compared with 1929.

The figures, supplied by the U. S. bureau of mines, show there were decreases in the output of all metals, with copper recording the largest loss.

The gold yield in Oregon in 1930 was estimated at \$286,300, a drop of about \$68,000 over the previous year.

Copper mined last year was valued at \$20,000. It was a decrease of \$95,300 compared with 1929.

The silver output in the state showed a decrease of 21,500 pounds, while the lead drop was 10,650 pounds.

WATTERS AND AMBROSE GET BIG APPLAUSE

Speakers at Chamber Of Commerce Luncheon Tell of Work

One of the largest crowds ever in attendance at a chamber of commerce forum luncheon, rose to their feet Wednesday to give voice to applause for T. B. Watters, for four years mayor of this city, and Keith K. Ambrose, chief of police and fire chief for the same period of time.

The outgoing city officers were introduced by R. C. Grossbeck, after which Keith Ambrose responded with a short talk, and ex-mayor Watters gave the address of the day.

In his short response, Ambrose told of coming to this city 23 years ago, of his service with the volunteer fire department before entering his official career.

"I like this town, the county and the people," said ex-chief Ambrose. "I am going to continue to live here the rest of my life, and do everything in my power for the advancement of Klamath county."

T. B. Watters, outgoing mayor, took for his subject "Four Years as Klamath Falls City Executive." Mr. Watters took this opportunity to thank the men who have given him advice during his four years in office. He outlined the financial work which had been his lot in the city's chief office, and spoke at length of the business deals, improvement projects and problems of the city.

Mr. Watters commended all the officers and the council working under him, giving special credit to C. C. Kelley, city engineer, under whose direction the municipal sewer, airport, and other improvement projects have been carried to completion.

E. S. Veach acted as chairman of the forum, and two delightful violin numbers were presented by Miss Katherine Walton, accompanied at the piano by Mrs. T. R. Gillenwaters.

Favors Minimum Term of Year In Oregon's Prison

SALEM, Jan. 7. (UP)—Governor Norblad announced here today that he would ask the forthcoming session of the state legislature to set one year as the minimum state penitentiary term.

"Sentencing men and women to the penitentiary for 60 or 90 days would mean the state's penal institutions would be to crowded, and taxpayers would be required to pay unnecessary costs," the governor declared.

Persons receiving a term of less than a year would be confined in county jails.

EMPLOYMENT AGENCY AIDS MANY PEOPLE

Railroads, Gas Company And Contractors Support City Office

Although the list of applicants needing work continues to grow daily at the city free employment agency at the corner of Seventh and Klamath avenue, many jobs of all kinds are being found for the men, a check of the situation revealed yesterday.

Contractors, business men and many residents having odd jobs, such as piling wood, are co-operating splendidly and are calling upon the agency whenever they need laborers, it only for a few hours, it was stated yesterday by W. E. Carter who is in charge of the employment office.

C. H. Taylor who is in charge of construction work on the extension of the Great Northern railroad southward into California has promised to employ all local men possible on the construction when the new camps open, probably in February, it was learned Wednesday.

The county court and state highway commission is employing all the labor needed for roadwork through the agency and within the past two weeks about 50 men have been given work through these two bodies and some of them will be retained permanently.

The local office of the Natural Gas company of Oregon is also hiring all men needed for work through the city's agency.

MANY GET JOBS

Last week employment, outside of highway work, was found for 14 men through the agency and with nine men already given work this week, the number is expected to reach 20 or 25 by Saturday evening.

There was \$161.20 paid out in wages last week, plus \$900 paid to highway employees. The amount paid out this week already almost totals \$80 it was learned through the records maintained at the agency.

INVESTIGATE APPLICANTS

The home conditions and the number of dependents on each applicant seeking employment is investigated by Miss Lydia Fricke, county health nurse. The men whose families are in need of the worst and those with several small children dependent upon him are given the first jobs.

The free employment bureau was started by the former council under T. B. Watters and is being carried on by the present city administration under F. H. Coker. It was organized under the principle that it would be better to give a man a chance to earn a few dollars and help himself and

family than for him to have to depend on charity.

A building for the employment office, wood, lights and telephone are all donated.
