

USE OF STATE WATER POWER RECOMMENDED

State Engineer Declares Legitimate Development Should be Aided

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 9. (UP)—Charles E. Stricklin, state engineer, in his biennial report filed today with Governor Norblad, recommended an inventory of Oregon's water power resources and enactment of legislation which would protect the public's interest in this natural asset.

"Of all natural resources of the state our waters are perhaps the most valuable," Stricklin said. "The future development of Oregon will depend largely upon the control and uses to which these waters are put. Encouragement and aid in legitimate development of this resource and legislation tending to retard such should be avoided. WOULD AID STATE

"In order that public interest may be protected, authority and funds should be provided for state engineers to make complete investigations of the importance of such waters."

The state reclamation commission and the state engineer would be aided greatly by such data. It was suggested in granting permits for the appropriation of water.

Stricklin also pointed out that funds for such an inventory and investigation could be raised through a small increase in the annual power fee.

CONTROL WATERS
The state engineer recommended the enactment of legislation by which the state could regulate and control the diversion of waters from private reservoirs, except those constructed by municipalities for other purposes than power development.

Should such legislation be enacted, Stricklin said, the state would then be able to control the water and divert it to the highest economic and beneficial use.

At present, the state engineer pointed out, the federal government practically controls the waters of the state after a permit has been issued covering power development.

Great Northern, Northern Pacific Merger Failure

NEW YORK, Jan. 9. (UP)—Plans for a gigantic consolidation between the Northern Pacific Railway company and Great Northern Railway company are to be withdrawn because of inability to divorce the Chicago, Burlington & Quincy railway, which they jointly control, it was announced tonight.

The withdrawal decision was announced by a unification committee of the two roads, after negotiations which had continued intermittently since the plan first was presented to the interstate commerce commission July 6, 1927. The commission approved the plan, finally on February 21, 1930.

Had it been consummated, the merger would have produced a railroad 15,151 miles in length in the states of Minnesota, Wisconsin, North and South Dakota, Montana, Idaho, Washington and Oregon, serving a population of around 10,000,000 persons and linking up with eastern roads at mid-continent.

Oust Mexicans From Railroad Jobs in East

TERRE HAUTE, Ind., Jan. 9. (UP)—Twenty-four Mexican construction workers on the Big Four railroad near here, were preparing tonight to leave the district, after a demonstration of 100 unemployed marched to their camp and demanded their jobs.

The demonstrators gathered first at the courthouse and after several speeches, moved to the construction camp. A spokesman called the Mexicans together and told them:

"We haven't room for foreigners here while we are starving. You'll have to get out."



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Cattlemen Get Banquet, Bets Paid

William Dalton and William Kitttridge were hosts at a banquet staged at the Hotel Willard last night for the Cattlemen's association. The banquet was the result of a bet.

Previous to the Oregon vs. Oregon State college football game they made a bet. The loser was to give a 1000-pound steer and the winner to furnish the banquet to the cattlemen.

"Bill" Dalton won the bet when Oregon triumphed over the Aggies and "Bill" Kitttridge lost the steer. Last night both paid their bets and as a result the cattlemen had a fine time and a great banquet at the hotel.

Progress Made Against T. B. in Dairy Cattle

OLYMPIA, Wash., Jan. 9. (UP)—Figures prepared today by Dr. Robert Prior, head of the state dairy and livestock division, showed that steady progress has been made in the control of tuberculosis among cattle in the United States.

"In 1928," Dr. Prior said, "7,110,724 cattle were slaughtered for beef in the United States. Of that total, 21,449, or a percentage of .32, were condemned because of tuberculosis."

"In 1929, 8,119,760 were slaughtered, of which 12,718, or a percentage of .15, were condemned."

Cost of Hat Now \$154.75 to Seattle Man

SEATTLE, Jan. 9. (UP)—It is believed that John Arnesen has paid more money for a hat than any other Seattle resident. The hat, so far, has cost Arnesen \$147.50 and 15 days in jail.

After Arnesen's car crashed into a truck in a traffic accident the other day, he hurriedly drove away from the scene of the mishap. During the experience, however, he lost his \$4.75 hat, and an hour later drove past the scene of the accident to recover it. Police arrested him.

He was fined \$100 and given 15 days in jail for reckless driving, and fined \$50 for being a hit-run driver.

OPPOSITION RELIEF PLAN MAPPED OUT

Interests of Country And City Brought Together By Wagner Bill

WASHINGTON, Jan. 9. (UP)—A four-fold program of relief, designed to bring together the interests of city and country, and a proposal for a huge unemployment insurance appropriation, emerged today as the aim of those opposed to the methods President Hoover is taking to meet the present economic emergency.

Senator Robert F. Wagner, democrat, New York, late in the day introduced a bill for federal-state cooperation in insurance against unemployment. The measure provides an annual appropriation of \$100,000,000 among the states on a basis of not more than one-third of each state fund being composed of federal money.

FOUR-POINT PLAN
As proposed by Senator Robert M. La Follette of Wisconsin, vigorous young insurgent republican, the four-point plan provides:

1. Appropriations for food and clothing in farm areas suffering from effects of the drought.
2. Adoption of some plan for federal aid to relief programs adopted by cities.
3. Adoption of a public building program "so great the government can prevent a repetition of the present situation next winter."
4. Mobilization of the intelligence of finance and industry to solve the problem of distribution and provide direct relief for unemployment.

LA FOLLETTE SPEAKS
Standing in the rear of the senate, La Follette spoke for an hour on what he termed the "utterly and tragically inadequate" relief plans of Mr. Hoover. He talked in his usual forthright manner, denigrating and pausing at intervals to brush back the hair that had tumbled down over his forehead.

The administration's drought relief bill still was tied up in the house, where republican leaders are seeking a way to eliminate the \$15,000,000 food loan provisions added by the senate. The main part of the bill provides a \$45,000,000 appropriation for stock feed and similar materials.

PARTIES IN ROW
There was a flare-up in the house today over the measure, democrats accusing republican leaders of delaying the bill by

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 9. (AP)—The Oregon public service commission announced it will hold a hearing on the supplementary application of the Great Northern railroad for relocation of its extension south of Klamath Falls. The commission will sit with the California public service commission at a hearing in Klamath Falls Tuesday, February 10, for and in behalf of the interstate commerce commission.

Counsel Frederick S. Meigs, assistant chief engineer, and D. L. Ellis, office engineer, both of Seattle, are here making preliminary arrangements for the hearing.

All necessary data to present to the public service commission at the hearing has been prepared. The initial survey for the line out of Klamath Falls, extending south 20 miles to the Tule Lake district, has been completed.

If permission is granted the Great Northern to build an independent line south, an official survey of the 20 miles will be made. This survey will differ only in minor details from the one just completed.

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 9. (UP)—The University of California at Los Angeles opened the Pacific coast conference basketball season here tonight by trouncing the Stanford Indians by a 22 to 23 score in Olympic auditorium.

Dick Luthie, Bruin center, tallied 12 points for the winners, who led 19 to 8 at halftime. Luthie, Brotemarkle and Knowles scored 14 points before Stanford could drop the ball through the hoop. The Bruins meet again tomorrow night.
