HOLD SOCIAL LEADER FOR MAN'S DEATH

Husband and Physician Both Exonerated Wife But Jury Blames Her

SANTA CRUZ, Jan. 9. (UP)—Mrs. Helene Grant Thornehill, beautiful young Santa Cruz social leader, lay in a semi-collapse tonight at Santa Cruz hospital, while a coroner's jury prepared to investigate the "natural death" of her husband.

Though allowed the comforts of the hospital, Mrs. Thornehill was under indictment for her husband's murder, and a deputy sheriff stood guard outside the door.

Mrs. Thornehill has been exonerated by two statements—one a dying declaration by her husband, one by the physician who attended him at his death. Officers and grand jury ignored both.

Thornehill, handsome young former royal northwest mounted policeman and wealthy track line owner, was shot on the night of December 25 at the height of a party at the home of a neighbor, Milton Main.

He made a statement immediately afterwards absolving his wife of all blame. He had been invited to the party, he said; she had been scolded. She had appeared around midnight, and found him far gone in liquor. She demanded that he accompany her home. He had said "No woman's going to order me about." She had drawn a revolver. In the struggle it was discharged and two bullets entered his shoulder and chest.

Thornehill's condition grew steadily worse and he died Thursday morning. Dr. M. J. Gates, his physician, signed a death certificate, to the astonishment of police, ascribing his death to pneumonia and lung congestion, complicated by chronic alcoholism. The bullet wounds he said, were located on the other side of his chest from the congestion and were superficial.

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Trees Available From Nursery at State College

Trees are again available for distribution from the state forest nursery at Corvallis; orders should be placed at the county agent's office, County Agent C. A. Henderson said Friday.

The following varieties of trees are available: Black locust, green ash, box elder, Chinese elm, western yellow pine, Scotch pine, Russian mulberry, western red cedar, Douglas fir, Austrian pine, Norway pine, Port Orford cedar, European larch, Norway spruce, of which the first six are generally recommended for this district.

The Chinese elm is a particularly desirable tree, being resistant and a rapid grower, as well as a beautiful tree. Box elder is perhaps the most rapid growing tree of this group, but is not such a good tree for general farm utility purposes.

COWMEN SHOOT OUT QUARREL IN RESTAURANT

SONORA, Cal., Jan. 9. (UP)—Reminiscence of the early days in California, when quickness on the draw was the only court of appeal, two Sonora men "shot it out" today as the climax of a quarrel.

"Jack" Casey, 27, a cowboy, with a friend, "Slim" Cramer, entered a Sonora restaurant where Frank Shell, a Hawhide rancher, was eating.

A quarrel ensued between Shell and Casey, and Shell, riding from his seat, suddenly drew an automatic from his pocket and fired three times. Two of the bullets took effect, one entering Casey's lung and the other penetrating his shoulder.

Cramer seized the weapon as his friend fell, and in attempting to wrest it from Shell, dis-

charged it, the bullet entering Shell's arm below the elbow.

Casey was taken to the Sonora hospital, where Dr. G. C. Wisley stated that his condition was serious. Shell was at the Sierra hospital with a fractured arm.

Sheriff J. H. Dambacher was investigating the shooting but was unable to learn the cause of the quarrel that led to the shooting.
