"Bill" Ingram New California Football Coach

NAVY GRID MENTOR TO COME WEST

Has 20 Years Experience As Player and Coach In Fall Sport

BERKELEY, Calif., Jan. 12. (UP)—Selection of William Ingram, former coach at the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis, as head football coach of the University of California for the next three years, was announced here late today.

The executive committee of associated students made the announcement after a session lasting more than an hour.

SALARY SECRET
Ingram, who disclosed Sunday that he had resigned from Navy, succeeds Clarence M. "Nibs" Price, whose unsuccessful season in 1930 resulted in his resignation last fall.

The salary that Ingram will receive was not revealed. His services were secured by William Noonan, graduate manager of California, who was granted permission to offer as much as \$15,000 a year, it was understood.

FOOTBALL 20 YEARS
The new coach will be permitted to select his own assistants. Ingram was closely associated with the game of football for 20 years.

After graduating from the Louisville, Ky., high school, he went to Annapolis, where he played halfback and quarterback in 1910, 1917 and 1918. In the latter year he was captain and was selected on an all-American team.

GOOD RECORD
Ingram returned to the naval academy in 1919 as assistant coach. He was later organized, coached and played on the Pacific fleet team for two years. He resigned from the navy in March of 1922 with the intention of entering private business but was persuaded to coach at William and Mary of Williamsburg, Va., in the fall of that year.

He gained prominence in 1922 when he became head coach at Indiana and served in that capacity until 1926, when he returned to coach at William and Mary. During the last five years, Navy teams under Ingram have won 52 games, lost 13 and tied four.

Mickey Walker Wins Bout by Technical K. O.
PHILADELPHIA, Jan. 12. (UP)—Mickey Walker, the "Toy Bulldog" of Newark, N. J., recently stripped of his middleweight title by various boxing commissions, won by a technical knockout from Matt Adgie, Philadelphia, in the first round of a scheduled 16-round bout at the Arena tonight.

After shaking Adgie with numerous rights and lefts in the early part of the round, Walker closed in on Adgie in the latter's corner.

Adgie vainly tried to slide along the ropes, but Walker caught him flush on the jaw with a wicked left hook. Matt sank to the floor flat on his back. At the count of six, he reached for the middle rope, at nine he grasped the upper rope to place himself in a kneeling position. His attempt to rise was in vain, for Referee Tommy Kelly stepped in and halted the one-sided affair.

'Moon' Mullins Given Contract
LAWRENCE, Kan., Jan. 12. (UP)—Larry "Moon" Mullins, former Notre Dame backfield star, today was presented a contract to coach the Kansas university football backfield next year. His salary was not announced.

Head Coach Bill Hargis and Steve Hinchaw and Mike Ghebo, assistant coaches, also were given new contracts for next year.

Balroma Wins; Pays \$117.10 to 1
NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 12. (UP)—Balroma, a five-year-old by Balot and Edrossa racing in the stinks of J. D. Grant, won the sixth race of the fair grounds this afternoon and paid \$236.20 for a \$2 straight mutual ticket.
This price is the highest paid on the American continent this year, and represents odds of \$117.10 to 1. In scoring his victory, Balroma defeated a field of nine over a distance of a mile and an eighth in exactly two minutes.

Minister Named On California Boxing Group
SACRAMENTO, Jan. 12. (UP)—Governor James Rolph today named Rev. Leslie Kelly of San Francisco as a member of the boxing commission to succeed H. W. Goodhart, resigned.
Rev. Kelly is a World war veteran and served as a chaplain in France for 14 months. He was at both the Meuse-Argonne and St. Mihiel battles.
Long a follower of boxing, the new commissioner was a leader in furthering the initiative measure passed four years ago which gave boxing its present status.
Goodhart, American Legion leader of Fresno, was appointed to the commission when it was formed two weeks ago, but was forced to resign because of press of business, he said.

Beavers Beat Idaho Quintet In Moscow 52-30
MOSCOW, Idaho, Jan. 12. (UP)—The Oregon State Beaver basketball team stopped one more higher in the coast conference percentage column when it defeated the University of Idaho Vandals, 52 to 30, here tonight.
Oregon State was ahead all the way, as fast floor work coupled with uncanny accuracy in hitting the basket held Idaho helpless in the first half and gave the Beavers a 25 to 11 lead as the half ended.
A sprinkling of Oregon State substitutes succeeded in holding off the Vandals in the second half.
Fagan, Beaver guard, was high point man for the evening with 16 points.

Tony Freitas Lands in Jail
SAUBALITO, CALIF., Jan. 12. (UP)—Tony Freitas, star pitcher of the Sacramento Senators, landed his automobile to show traffic officers how to do fancy curves. It was charged here today when he was sentenced to serve five days in the Marin county jail for reckless driving.
It was asserted that officers had to pursue Freitas up back slopes and through side streets of Mill valley before they caught him.

Import Snow for Ski Tournament
CHICAGO, Jan. 12. (UP)—Lack of snow has forced officials of the National Ski association to import snow for the national championship tournament to be held at Cary Hill, Fox River grove, Illinois.
Six freight cars were loaded today at Escanaba, Mich., and will be hauled 328 miles to Fox River grove. Work of hauling it to the Cary Hill slide will begin Thursday morning and the 150-foot runway and 360-foot slide will be surfaced for Sunday's championship meet.

GOOD ARENA
Gaston Fernandez, Astoria sportsman, will be manager for the two evenings in the bouts. The fight arena at Merrill is larger than the Legion hall, is well heated and ventilated and is a first class, half-hour drive from Klamath Falls, Mr. Bickerstaff said.

With a fight on in Klamath Falls over the selection of a matchmaker for the boxing commission, Bickerstaff at the instance of many prominent fight fans, took advantage of the opportunity to again present Pothier in a bout and after some negotiations was able to secure Marcus.

Pothier in a fight here with Divie LaFlood won easily and as in his first appearance here he went the full 15 rounds without a drink of water or a second in the ring to fan him.

Mrs. Washburn Dies at Home At Willow Ranch
WILLOW RANCH, Calif., Jan. 12.—Mrs. Louise F. Washburn, pioneer resident of Goose Lake valley, passed away here Wednesday at the ranch which has been her home for over 50 years. Deceased was the widow of William D. Washburn, one of the very first settlers to occupy land in this region, and was almost 86 years old at the time of her death.

She came to Modoc county in 1878 and was well known in Lake and Modoc counties and in the Sacramento region. She was born in Dale county, Alabama, July 9, 1842.

Deceased leaves two daughters, Mrs. Clara Stridling Hise of Sacramento and Mrs. W. E. Stapp of Hackberry, Ariz. She also leaves seven grandchildren: Ole, Spencer and Albert Stridling of this place; Mrs. Mona Vincl and Laurie Lee Hader of Sacramento; Denzil Hader and Mrs. Leslie Pichek of Arizona, and several great-grandchildren.
