Dr. Kellems to Discuss Great Question Tonight

"Is Jesus Christ the Son of God?" This is the theme which Dr. Kellems will discuss tonight at the First Christian church. There is no question more fundamental to the life of the church today than this.

"We have a great deal today," said Dr. Kellems in announcing this subject, "about God and religion. The church however, it is interested in the continuance of its work upon the earth is interested in Christ and Christianity. This message is one which has been preached around the world and has several times been given as a university address."

"Men are interested in religion," continued the doctor in his sermon. "Wherever I go today I find that they want to know what experience a man has had with divine things. There is the feeling among many that in some way about which they are not quite sure they have been informed historically criticism has dissolved the foundations of the ancient faith. But while the foundations of that faith have been destroyed the need remains."

"The same old question tortures the soul. 'Why am I here? What is my destiny? What about sinfulness? If a man dies shall he live again?' One of the most brilliant young men in Klamath Falls said to me this very day: 'Why, doctor, the world simply cannot live without religion.' And that young man is right."

"These days of decline when the receding tides have left the ghastly wrecks along the unsightly shore, will come back again with a rush and carry us higher than ever before."

M. Matlock, Veneta, Ore., 40 acres, Lane county, \$1,579.

LAKEVIEW MEN ASK KLAMATH AID ON ROAD

Yellowstone Cutoff And Fremont Highway Union Object

Ernest Fetsch, president of the Lakeview chamber of commerce, and Forest Cooper, Lakeview attorney and secretary of the Lakeview chamber, were visitors in Klamath Falls Tuesday, and attended the regular meeting of the board of directors of the Klamath county chamber of commerce.

Mr. Fetsch presented arguments in favor of the Burns-Lakeview highway, which would connect with the so-called Yellowstone highway, assisting materially in the development of Lakeview. "As you know, Lakeview is more or less isolated," Mr. Fetsch stated to the local directors, "and the one thing that will assist in the development of our town is transportation. The Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway has helped, but our ideal is the Yellowstone cutoff and the Lakeview-Burns highway, which would bring 50,000 cars through Lakeview the first year, and an increasing number each year afterward. The Yellowstone cutoff will be a shorter route from San Francisco to the National park, and it is obvious that of the tourists so near to the great scenic attraction, Crater Lake, the greater number would visit Klamath Falls, swelling Klamath's tourist registration."

Although the local chamber has pledged as much support as possible to the Lakeview-Burns highway project, first allegiance goes to the Warm Springs-Wapinitia cutoff, which is meeting lessening money time from this city to Portland, and will, when the proposed Weed-Klamath Falls highway is completed, give a route from San Francisco to Portland that will consume only two days by automobile. Klamath Falls will greatly profit by this proposed route.

On January 9, the Roads and Highway committee of the chamber of commerce met with the Klamath county court and went on record as supporting the Warm Springs-Wapinitia cutoff, and to this end, C. A. Dunn was appointed as Klamath county's representative to endorse this project at the State Highway hearing to be held in Portland on January 15. Mr. Dunn will also endorse the allocation of \$194,000 federal appropriation for the Wapinitia project.

After considerable argument as to which road would be more beneficial to Klamath Falls, the board of the local chamber Tuesday passed a resolution to instruct their representative, C. A. Dunn, to endorse the Wapinitia-Warm Springs cutoff as originally decided, but if it became apparent that the State Highway Commission was not favorably inclined toward the project, to switch his allegiance to the Burns-Lakeview cutoff project.

Mr. Fetsch and Mr. Cooper left for Medford yesterday afternoon to present their arguments in the Lakeview-Burns cutoff over KEMD from 6:15 to 6:45 o'clock. Others in the Lakeview delegation that passed through Klamath Falls in the interior of the highway development, were Snyder, commissioner of Lake county, and "Buck" Smith, one of the largest livestock owners in the state. These men will also attend the State Highway hearing in Portland on Thursday.

Lakeview representatives expressed some surprise in the recent action of the Klamath chamber in endorsing the Warm Springs-Wapinitia cutoff in preference to the Lakeview-Burns project, as they had in their possession a letter from the local chamber written last August, in which the local body went on record as endorsing Lakeview's request.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 13 (UP)—Wade Crawford, tribal representative of the Klamath Indians of Oregon, told the senate committee on Indian affairs today that lumber companies were being allowed to remove timber from Klamath lands "at a ridiculously low figure."

Crawford charged that the government, through the Indian bureau, was permitting the companies "practically to name their own prices." He alleged that part of the money derived therefrom was being used to build roads on the reservation chiefly for the benefit of the lumber interests.
