

PRESIDENT OF ARMOUR FIRM DIES IN FALL

Falls Seven Stories; Built
Up Business; Believe
White Fainted

CHICAGO, Jan. 15 (UP)—F. Edson White, president of Armour and Co., fell to his death tonight from a window of his seventh floor apartment on Chicago's exclusive Gold Coast.

White was preparing to attend a hockey game and was chatting about it with Mrs. White, his sister, Miss Kathleen Pierce and Philip L. Reed, treasurer of Armour and Co., when he casually excused himself.

FALLS OUT WINDOW

He stroiled into his bedroom. A minute later a neighbor telephoned the White apartment to say that someone had fallen from the window. White's lifeless body was found on the pavement seven floors below.

White's wife said she believed he either suffered a fainting spell and fell from the window or that the room was stuffy and that he lost his balance in struggling to open the window.

Reed added that White fainted at a dinner given by the packing company last night and struck his head in falling from his chair.

BUILT UP BUSINESS

White became president of Armour and Co. in 1923 when the late J. Ogden Armour retired as active head. Under his management the firm did an unusually increasing business until last year the company sales reached into the millions, with shipments of meat products into every civilized country in the world.

Only last week White issued a particularly optimistic statement concerning the future of the meat packing industry and Armour and Co. in view of the recent modification of the packers' consent decree, which will allow the packers in the future to trade in other food products besides meat.

Inventor Plans Flight to Moon, To Use Rocket

NEW YORK, Jan. 15. (UP)—Robert Esnault-Pelterie, who is not utterly an impractical dreamer, since it was he who invented the "stick" by which airplanes trip to the moon, some day, and return in 48 hours.

He plans to leave the earth at the rate of 6 miles a second, gain speed as he progresses, tack around the Lunar planet when he reaches it, and return to earth to tell the scientific societies all about his discoveries.

Esnault-Pelterie arrived in New York today at the invitation of the American Interplanetary society. For 25 years, he has been engaged in research into the problem of reaching the moon.

The cost of the first vehicle, a rocket, will be about \$2,000,000, he said.

Deport American Publisher From Shores of Cuba

HAVANA, Cuba, Jan. 15 (UP)—Orders were issued late today for the deportation of John T. Wilford, an American citizen, publisher of the Havana American, an English language newspaper here.

The Havana American was closed last week, together with most of the Spanish language newspapers in Havana, at the orders of President Gerardo Machado.

Wilford has been living in Cuba for 20 years.

The order is effective immediately. It gave no reason for Wilford's deportation, but it was generally presumed that articles in his paper against the present government were responsible.

Near-Tornado Hits Canadian Fields

REGINA, Sask., Jan. 15 (UP)—A gale of near-tornado intensity, shrouded Canada's western wheat prairies in dust clouds so thick today that the sky at noon appeared as though dusk had descended.

The wind reached a velocity of 70 miles an hour at Grand Level where it picked up loose boards and rubbish and sent them swirling through the air.

Airmail pilots, forced to scurry for shelter, said the wind shrieked at 80 miles an hour at an altitude of 500 feet.

U. S. to Continue Panama Relations

WASHINGTON, Jan. 15. (UP)—The United States has decided to continue diplomatic relations with the new Panamanian government of Dr. Ricardo J. Alfaro, without making any formal announcement of recognition. It was indicated by informed officials here tonight.

New York and New England in Grasp of Winter

NEW YORK, Jan. 15. (UP)—With New England districts reporting temperatures as low as 16 degrees below zero, New York city today experienced the coldest day of the new year, with thermometers reaching a minimum of 11 above.

The sudden cold wave sent a record number of homeless persons to the municipal lodging house, where 2,275 men and 73 women registered during the day. Many requests for free coal were reported by police and various welfare agencies.

At Albany a temperature of 4 above was reported today, with much colder weather in the northern districts of New York state. At Saranac lake it was 12 below. Norwalk, Conn., also reported 12 below, and similar temperatures prevailed in the southern Berkshire hills region.

Sixty Policemen Prevent Riot in Oakland Street

OAKLAND, Calif., Jan. 15. (UP)—Sixty policemen called to prevent a riot of 1,000 persons who had been antagonized by the eviction of a widow from her home here today prevented a serious disturbance by taking up a collection for the woman.

The police officers and members of the rebellious crowd quickly raised \$18 to provide a new home for Mrs. Clara Orlas, whose husband died a month ago, and a truck driver offered to take her furniture, which had been dumped into the street, to her new dwelling free of charge.

Mrs. Orlas was one month in arrears in her rent. She said her roomers were out of work and owed her considerable money. Also, she said, she is now the sole support of a five-year-old daughter, Ruth, who was hurt in an automobile accident last November.

The owner of the house, M. Westway, proprietor of a second hand clothing store, secured a writ of eviction in police court. Deputy Constables L. H. Hoover and J. W. Slattery, with several assistants, went to the house and began moving Mrs. Orlas' furniture into the street. A crowd gathered and an angry mob of men and women, many of them unemployed, were criticizing the constables in strong manner.

Prince of Wales Sails Soon For Latin America

LIVERPOOL, Eng., Jan. 15 (UP)—Twenty-seven elaborate pieces of luggage, including two sets of golf clubs, were loaded aboard the steamship Grospeza today, carrying most of the personal belongings which the Prince of Wales is taking with him on an extended tour of Latin American countries.

The Grospeza proceeded to La Rochelle-Pallice, France, the first stop on its present South American voyage. The prince, accompanied by his youngest brother, Prince George, and a considerable suite, will go on board at St. Ander, Spain. He will proceed to Bahia, Paraguay, by air, tomorrow, with Prince George, and will go from there to Santander to join the Grospeza for the voyage to Bermuda, where they are due January 27.

First Feminine Telegrapher Dies

DENVER, Jan. 15. (UP)—Alice J. Dunlop, 52, who defied convention in her youth and became the first woman telegrapher in the world, was dead here tonight. She succumbed to the infirmities of old age.

As a girl in Delphi, Ind., Miss Dunlop became intrigued with the new invention of Samuel F. B. Morse and arranged with friends who knew him for an introduction. Morse at once took an interest in her and enrolled her among his personal pupils.

Flames Destroy County Courthouse

ANNISTON, Ala., Jan. 15. (UP)—The Calhoun county courthouse was completely destroyed by fire here late today. Loss was estimated at \$200,000, with \$110,000 insurance.

Only the brick walls, erected in 1880, and steel vaults within were left standing. Records in vaults were believed safe.

Circuit Court Clerk A. H. Shepperd was suffering from over-exertion after having flames to store important records in the vaults. Deputy Sheriff S. J. Cobb was injured while assisting firemen.

Birth Control League Raps Hoover Conference, Learns Important Facts

NEW YORK, Jan. 15. (UP)—The American birth control league in annual convention today, applauded statements that the average family should have but three children, learned about the astonishing decrease in the offspring of Vassar girls, and passed resolutions damning President Hoover's child conference with the faintest of praise "because it didn't strike at the roots of present day family evils."

The league listened to ringing condemnation of the Pope's encephalic on birth control and marriage, and discovered that "colleges are sterilizing our students exactly as the monasteries and nunneries of the middle ages sterilized the scholars of that time."

There were many noteworthy figures in the list of speakers both at today's luncheon and afterwards, in the afternoon's symposium.

Professor Julian Huxley, writer and biologist, was among those who patting the movement on the back. He cited the Pope's encephalic as evidence of the "long, hard fight" ahead of the league, and pointed out that English laws are much more liberal than those in the United States regarding dissemination of contraceptive information.

Fire Guts Old Bahai Temple, Built on Dream

CHICAGO, Jan. 15. (UP)—A spectacular fire today gutted the fantastic \$2,000,000 Bahai temple, started 15 years ago, and still uncompleted, on the shore of Lake Michigan a few miles north of Chicago.

"The court feels that the proposed road is one of the most necessary to be built in the county. The present problem is to devise ways and means of financing the construction of such roads and the proposed bridge," Judge Fred R. Goddard stated in regard to the petitions.

The petition yesterday is the second such petition filed as a previous petition bearing several hundred names was presented to the court about a year ago.

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Italian Armada Lands in Rio After Flight

RIO DE JANEIRO, Jan. 15. (UP)—Eleven Italian seaplanes, commanded by Gen. Italo Balbo, air minister, landed on the placid waters of the outer harbor late today and successfully completed one of the most ambitious trans-Atlantic flying adventures in the history of aviation.

They were sighted flying low over Sugar Loaf mountain in Rio de Janeiro's beautiful harbor, at 4:25 p. m., on the last lap of their long voyage. The planes circled over the city and came down to the surface of Botafogo bay at 4:48 p. m. They had completed the 6,250-mile flight from Lake Orbetello, Italy, begun December 17—an achievement which took five lives but which aroused the imagination of millions.

They were acclaimed by the people of Brazil with all the martial pomp and glory accorded to conquering heroes. Warship guns boomed a sonorous welcome. The air was filled with airplanes dipping their wings in salute.

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Cement Company Adds 350 Workers To Payroll Monday

RIVERSIDE, Cal., Jan. 15. (UP)—The Riverside Cement company will add 350 men to its payroll Monday, bringing its force to 425 employees, it was announced tonight.

Karl McDonald, general superintendent, said that federal state and municipal building programs on the Pacific coast had increased the demand for the company's products.

MAYOR MAY ACT TODAY

One Officer Withdraws
Name from Petition for
Commission Hearing

The withdrawal of the name of former policeman Paul Gravelle from the petition signed by six policemen who were ousted on January 3, without reason given, marked the only action yesterday in the move of policemen who were ousted to test the validity of the city civil service law.

Five names remain on the petition demanding a hearing for the cause of removal which will bring about an investigation of the cause for firing the men.

The appointments to the civil service commission which is now vacant with the expiration of the term of one member, and the resignation of the remaining two, have not yet been announced.

Time for the filing of a report by the mayor as to why the commissioners resigned, one of whom states he is resigning by request, will expire tonight, according to the city charter, and it is possible that a special council meeting will be held sometime today.
