

## CRIM, DEMOTT SEMI-WINDUP AT MERRILL

Light Heavyweights Will  
Provide Fine Battle  
On Good Card

A bout scheduled for six rounds at the light heavyweight limit has been arranged by Matchmaker Joe Bickelstaff between Jess DeMott, a fighting lad raised in Merrill, and Jack Crim, who recently returned from a successful semi-windup in the Marcus-Pothier card in Merrill Friday night, January 23.

DeMott has many friends who know his fighting ability, but also know that when he clashes with Jack Crim he will have to be at his best. Crim, a Chilquin battling genius, stands out against the ordinary type of fighter. His sensational knockout scored over Stumbock Jackson was an example of fine boxing.

DeMott had a lot of experience in three main event fights around Kansas City, Joplin and Oklahoma. He won each bout easily and stopped two of his opponents in short order. Crim is called a clever boxer and has started taking the fight game seriously. He is almost 25 years of age, lives out in the open air, and is always in great shape.

DeMott has met the best

fighters in the Pacific coast and in 30 battles was stopped only once.

His boosters around Merrill and Malin are confident that he will take the Chilquin champion. For the first time in his ring history Jess will have a weight advantage. For the bout with Crim he will scale 170. His opponent weighs 163.

## MRS. KELLEMS JOINS SERVICE

South American Lady,  
Famous Violinist, Arrives to Aid Husband

One of the most interesting members of the Kellem brothers evangelistic party arrived last night from Los Angeles in the person of Mrs. Inez Toledano Kellem, the wife of Dr. Jesse R. Kellem, who has been leading the campaign at the First Christian church. Mrs. Kellem has been visiting her mother, Senora Georgianna Toledano, late of New York City and Cartagena, republic of Colombia.

Mrs. Kellem is a beautiful South American lady, the daughter of the late Mauricio Toledano, one of the leading financiers of

Colombia. She was educated in New York, Paris and Rome, having studied at the University of Paris and Columbia university for her academic training.

Her specialty in the educational field has been languages and the violin. Mrs. Kellem was a noted leader in the younger set of Spanish-American society in New York and her name appears with that of Dr. Kellem in the American Social Register.

Like her husband, she is a noted traveler and a very close student of political affairs. She will be one of the chief attractions at the services on Sunday and will present one of her beautiful violin solos Sunday night.

"DO NOTHING"—LOST

One of the largest meetings of the present series was enjoyed last night at the First Christian church. Dr. Kellem sang his first solo of the present campaign. He took as his sermon theme, "What Must I Do to Be Lost?" He said in part: "You ask me this question, 'What must I do to be lost?' and I can answer you in

two words, 'do nothing.' Just go right on as you are now. Treat all the claims of religion with complacency. Neglect. One need not sow tares these days. There are many who are not so foolish as to do this. But whether we sow them or not they will be there. They will grow as weeds unbidden grow in our gardens."

Sunday is to be a great day at the church. It is planned to have 300 in the Bible school and Dr. Kellem is going to show some pictures of Africa. These are government slides which were loaned to him by the government office in New York City.
