RED CROSS SENDS FUNDS

Young Bound To Klamath Jury By Justice Barnes

Jack Young, alias Harry Tait, charged with forgery, and recently extradited from Los Angeles, waived preliminary hearing in justice court Friday, and was bound over to the grand jury.

Axel Benson pleaded guilty to a charge of possession of liquor in justice court yesterday, and was fined \$100. After paying this amount, Benson was released from custody.

Oakley Hawkins, 16 year old youth, who, with Oscar Wilson, is charged with having stolen an automobile from this city, and wrecking it near Ashland, was arraigned before Justice of the Peace W. B. Barnes. The boy is alleged to have escaped from Monroe, Wash., Reformatory. Young Hawkins is also wanted on several counts in Jackson county, and he will probably be returned to the reformatory, local officers state. Oscar Wilson, the other youth implicated in the car robbery, is serving an indeterminate sentence not to exceed two years, in the state penitentiary.

Miller is Bound Over to U. S. Jury

Ed Miller was bound over to the federal grand jury Friday by United States Commissioner R. C. Thomas, on a charge of the manufacture and possession of moonshine whiskey. Miller stated that this arrest made his fifth on liquor charges. Federal prohibition officer L. L. McBride said. The alleged "moonshiner" was apprehended Thursday night by officers McBride and Linville in a small house near Shippington.

RED CROSS SENDS FUNDS

Drought Relief Aided By Klamath County; Ask Contributions

Six hundred dollars was forwarded Thursday by the Klamath county chapter of Red Cross to R. E. Arns, Pacific coast executive of that organization, as an initial step in responding to the call issued by President Hoover for \$10,000,000 with which to aid thousands of poverty-stricken people in the several drought districts.

In addition to the contribution of \$600, the local chapter has made arrangements to receive voluntary cash subscriptions from Klamath county citizens, which will be forwarded as soon as possible and which, it is hoped, will swell the local fund to a total of \$1200. Arrangements have been made with Leslie Rogers of the First National bank, and George Walton, secretary of the Klamath county chapter, to receive contributions to the local fund.

Directors of the local chapter announced yesterday that a quota of \$1,200 had been assigned Klamath county, and explained the reason for forwarding only half that amount Thursday was due to the desire to avoid making a concerted drive immediately on the heels of the annual membership drive, which closed only Christmas. The \$600 contribution made was from the membership fund of the chapter, and it was deemed inadvisable to make further inroads on that fund if a sufficient balance is carried to meet local demands for relief.

Heads of the local chapter are hopeful, however, that public spirited citizens will heed the call and will make sufficient contributions through Messrs. Rogers and Walton to raise the en-

tire quota of \$1200.

Thursday Chairman Payne of the American Red Cross issued a statement saying that 405,000 persons in the drought stricken areas were being assisted, and that the pitiful condition extends to 383 counties in 21 states. The condition in Arkansas is such that people in 66 of the 75 counties in that state are receiving aid from the Red Cross.
