

ASK OWNERS OF HOMES TO AID JOBLESS

Repairing Dwellings Will Help Unemployment, Says W. D. Miller

An appeal to every local homeowner to lend a helping hand to the unemployed by having needed home repairs and remodeling work done immediately was issued yesterday by W. D. Miller, president of the W. D. Miller Construction company.

"In issuing this appeal," he declared, "I am merely reiterating the one made by Colonel Arthur Woods, head of President's Hoover's Emergency Committee on Unemployment, who believes that repairing and remodeling of the nation's homes offers one of the great opportunities to alleviate unemployment. There is nothing selfish about it. Because home owners can have this work done now at low prices that may never be reached again. The present is the ideal time for such expenditures."

HELP PROSPERITY

He pointed out that the great national unemployment problem is only the sum of hundreds and thousands of local unemployment problems and that only by relieving the local situation can citizens really help the nation as a whole. He also declared that the building industry is responsible for nearly 21 per cent of the nation's jobs and consequently is Colonel Woods' statement the most vital factor perhaps in the restoration of prosperity.

He clearly indicates his belief in the importance of stimulating the building industry. He feels sure that if home owners will do their part, this work, combined with the huge public improvement now being pushed into action, will soon solve the unemployment problem.

WOODS' APPEAL

"As householders and home owners," says Colonel Woods, "we can now, in this time of excess labor and low cost materials, do those things of permanent value to our homes and in our communities which we have always wanted to do."

"Let us spruce up our homes—make the repairs that are needed—do that little job of painting we thought about so long ago—fix up the odd corners of the yard—replace the worn out or broken parts that halt the smooth running of the household."

ASK LEADERSHIP

Colonel Woods appeals to every home owner in every community to be a leader in this work—not wait for the other fellow or the neighbor next door to lead the way. "Savings bank deposits," he says, "show increases. Certainly America has not become a hoarding nation, afraid of its own future! In the matter of an attitude toward life at this time, the nation needs the leadership of its millions of citizens—each an example to the other."

Every lumber dealer in the United States has been asked by C. E. Stodman, vice-president of President Hoover's Building Survey conference, to help broadcast this appeal and thus assist in bringing about a quick return of prosperity to the nation.

Magistrate's Trial Ends in Disagreement

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Both trials of Martin J. Healy and Thomas T. Tommany, Tammany politicians, accused of accepting a \$10,000 bribe from Mrs. Ewald to urge Ewald's nomination, ended in jury deadlocks. Dr. Francis Schrip, political committeeman of the Stuenben society, is under indictment charged with furthering Ewald's endorsement for a \$2,000 consideration.

When Supreme Court Justice McCook, who presided at the grand jury investigation and the three subsequent trials dis-

agreed the jury, Sydney Syme, counsel for the Ewald, Healy and Tommany trio, moved for immediate dismissal of the charges against his clients, but special prosecutor Hiram Todd blocked the move with an appeal for a deferred decision pending a conference with Attorney General John J. Bennett.

Ewald resigned shortly after the grand jury indicted him and his wife on the specific charge of paying \$10,000 to Healy through Tommany under the guise of a loan for whatever political pressure he could bring to bear to ensure the nomination after Dr. Schrip, through the powerful German-American organization he represented had recommended the appointment to Mayor Walker.
