K. I. D. BOARD TALKS PHONES

Deferred O. & M. Charges Discussed at Meeting in Courthouse

Propositions whereby the Columbia Utilities company would enter into a contract with the Klamath project of the United States government, and operate the government telephone lines, were favorably received by the board of directors of the Klamath Irrigation district at their regular meeting yesterday afternoon by D. O. Hood, owner of the company.

The government operates telephone lines from Klamath Falls to Merrill, from Merrill to Langell Valley, to Clear Lake Dam, one line north through Fox Valley and another south through the same valley, and one line to Gerber Dam. These lines are used by ditch riders and government employees for business purposes only. Mr. Hood proposes to lease this system, start reconditioning lines and poles, and later construct a direct line from Clear Lake to Altura. At present telephone connections with the latter place are inadequate and expensive.

The matter of asking government relief on deferred operation and maintenance charges for the district was discussed by directors and H. E. Hayden, superintendent of the Klamath project. It was decided that the only method of securing this aid would be through an act of congress. The resolution will be framed the next session of the board.

The next regular meeting of the board will be held February 7, at which time J. C. Boyle, assistant general manager of the California Oregon Power company will meet with the board, and discuss plans for completing the minimum of electric runways of less than 100-horsepower in the district.

CRACK G. N. TRAINS DUE IN 15 MONTHS

Arthur Curtis James In Sacramento Tells of Construction

Through passenger trains of the Great Northern will be rolling into Klamath Falls from St. Paul and on to Sacramento and San Francisco in April, 1932—only 15 months from now. This was the significant statement made in Sacramento Friday by Arthur Curtis James, railroad executive and director of the Northern lines.

"And from that time on," the statement of James continues, "we confidently expect enlargement of the rail business until Great Northern trains wheel through Klamath Falls from the Pacific northwest to Sacramento and other points south."

The routing of modern, through passenger trains from St. Paul and from points in the Pacific Northwest through Klamath Falls over the Great Northern to California points over the joint line of that company and the Western Pacific will mean much in the way of railroad expansion in this city. It will mean the addition of new train crews and the enlargement of shop and other payrolls to operate and service the additional trains which will run regularly through Klamath Falls.

SACRAMENTO, Jan. 17. (A. P.)—James announced that construction of this 200-mile rail link in Superior California is proceeding on schedule, work having been especially favored by good weather during the fall and early winter. He will personally inspect the development when he visits this section again late in the spring.

James, who is chairman of the board of directors of the Western

Pacific, a director of the Great Northern, reputed to be the largest individual stockholder in the Southern Pacific company, and also interested in other rail lines in the east, is en route to San Francisco to attend a meeting of the Western Pacific's board of directors within the next 10 days.

EMPLOY 1200 MEN

James reported that approximately 1200 men now are off the job in building the Great Northern-Western Pacific link, and this number will be increased to at least 2000 by late spring.

WORST DONE

Virtually all of the heavy rock excavation and tunneling were finished before stormy weather started. Construction in the plateau area north of Westwood has been suspended until spring, but work in that section is ahead of schedule.

The workmen are not concentrated in any one spot along the 200-mile route of the rail tie-in, the small army being engaged in numerous jobs all along the lengthy frontier.
