

KELEMS TO BE FORUM SPEAKER

President Bubb Appoints Legislative, Railroad Committees

The first of a series of travel talks to be sponsored by the Klamath chamber of commerce will be heard Wednesday noon, January 21, at the forum luncheon at Hotel Willard, when Dr. Jesse Kelems will give an illustrated talk on "Alaska, the Land of the Future."

Dr. Kelems and his brother, Dr. Homer Kelems, have both toured extensively in Alaska and have taken some excellent pictures, the best of which have been made into slides and will be shown at the luncheon.

Dr. Jesse Kelems, who has crossed the Atlantic ocean 27 times, has had a variety of experiences during his world-wide travels and has the reputation of being an interesting speaker. Rev. Arthur Eaton will preside as chairman at the forum.

She claimed the property was seized when the district attorney's office held her incommunicado for 48 hours a few days after she left Miss Bow's employer.

It was learned that during June of 1929, Miss Bow's bill for silk stockings was \$29.

"This check paid for the stockings," explained the former secretary.

"How about this one for \$124.65?" someone asked.

"Just for perfume and makeup during August," said Daley.

"And this one for \$235 on August 2, 1929?"

"Liquor," she replied. "There was a party, you know."

The Great Northern proposes in its amended application to follow the east side of The Dalles-California highway and the east side of Lost river to a point about a quarter of a mile from Merrill and then so practically due east to within a half mile of Malin. From that point the Great Northern would turn south to join the former survey where work has been going on in putting up grade.

CHANGE ASKED

The change in the route was asked by Malin, Merrill and Klamath people who felt that a larger territory could be served if the route were slightly changed. Even if the amended application is disallowed by the interstate commerce commission the Great Northern could still build south on the original route which was allowed by the commission last June.

A second hearing which will take place this week in which Klamath county people are interested will be held in Washington, D. C., before the public lands committee of the United States senate.

MCCORMICK HEARING

A senate bill authorizing the purchase by the Klamath irrigation district of the McCormick power site on the Klamath river south of Keno at a price of \$12,600 will be up for hearing.

Testimony in behalf of the district has already been presented to the committee by Hest E. Hanev, Portland attorney, retained by the district. Monday and Tuesday the committee is scheduled to hear any testimony that anyone may wish to present in opposition to the bill and rebuttal testimony by the district.

The McCormick power site controversy has been one of the foremost in the district during the past year with property owners taking decided stands for and against the proposition of the district entering the power business, bonding the district lands heavily and diverting waters which they argue are needed for irrigation purposes to power purposes.

MRS. HOWARD RETURNS HOME

Practice of Prosecutors in Regard to Subpoenas Is Attacked

PORTLAND, Jan. 17. (UP)—Mrs. H. W. Howard, state witness in the Bowles murder case, who was beaten and stabbed by an unidentified man Thursday afternoon, was sufficiently recovered from her injuries that she was removed from St. Vincent's hospital to her home tonight. It was at first feared that she suffered a skull fracture but an x-ray today showed that there was no fracture.

PORTLAND, Jan. 17. (UP)—The practice of the district attorney's office of issuing grand jury subpoenas when members of the district attorney's staff merely want to question witnesses was assailed by the defense today in a hearing to quash indictments for first degree murder against Nelson C. Bowles and his co-conspirator, Miss Irma Lankas.

The hearing was adjourned by Circuit Judge W. A. Eckwall until Monday morning.

CALL ATTORNEYS

Both District Attorney Lotus L. Langley and his chief deputy, George Mowry, were called to the witness stand by the defense and questioned about the practice of issuing subpoenas. Ralph King, defense counsel, attacked the legality of the practice and Mowry defended it and said it has been done for many years.

Upon the insistence of the defense Judge Eckwall directed that Mowry produce all the original grand jury subpoenas for December. The subpoenas were locked up, however, and the file

clerk gone home, so the hearing was adjourned until Monday.

JOINT INDICTMENT

Earlier in the session the district attorney's office elected to try Bowles and Miss Lankas on the joint indictment charging them both with the first degree murder of Bowles' wife, Mrs. Leone C. Bowles. Two other indictments which named but one defendant in each instrument were then dismissed by Eckwall.

It was explained, however, that the fact that they will be tried on the joint indictment, does not necessarily mean that they will be tried jointly.

EXPECT MOB OF NEGROES

JEFFERSON CITY, Mo., Jan. 18. (UP)—It was a call from Mayor W. O. Garrett of Maryville which prompted Governor Henry S. Caulfield to order the Maryville national guard unit mobilized, the executive told the United Press early today.

Governor Caulfield said he was stopped on the highway between Columbia and Jefferson City as he was returning from the former city and informed there was an urgent telephone call for him. The caller was Mayor Garrett, he said.

CALLS OUT GUARD

In the face of conditions as described to him by the mayor, the governor said, he felt justified in calling out the national guard. He said the mayor told him of the reported negro mob moving on the town, and added that there appeared to be an undercurrent of excitement in the town.

"I called Captain Edward Condon and ordered him to mobilize the detachment at Maryville," the executive said. "I also told him to inform the captain of the guard

at Burlington Junction and tell him to mobilize his men."

The governor said the Burlington Junction detachment would be ordered to Maryville if necessary.

He said latest reports to him were there was no immediate danger.

MONKEY BURIAL

KIRKWOOD, N. J.—Dude, pet monkey of Mr. and Mrs. George Bernard, died recently, and the animal received a funeral which rivaled that of some humans. It was laid to rest in a little white coffin, bearing a silver plate inscribed with his name, which is reported to have cost more than \$200. The monkey had been a pet of the family for seven years.

nia holds special primary election for this purpose.

SEPTEMBER PRIMARY

"TO GET around the difficulty mentioned, my bill will provide that the regular biennial primary election of 1932 will be held on Tuesday instead of Friday in May, and the regular biennial primary election of 1934 will be held on the second Tuesday of September."

"THIS BILL, if enacted into law, would be giving the people of Oregon an opportunity to see what the benefits of the September primary would be, and they could then provide some means of selecting the delegates to the national convention."

PRESIDENTIAL YEARS

THE MULTNOMAH school pointed out that dates for primaries for state conventions in Maryland, Connecticut, Delaware, New Mexico, Rhode Island and Utah, not fixed by law, will be set by party organizations.

IN PRESIDENTIAL years, the state nominating primaries in Pennsylvania, West Virginia and Nebraska are held the same day as the presidential preferential primaries, Bennett said.

Alabama holds its state nominating primary on the second Tuesday in May in presidential election years.

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
