Hoover's Hand Seen in Dry Law Report

Revision Favored In First Findings

President Persuaded Wickersham Commission to Change Recommendation

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WASHINGTON, Jan. 20. (UP)—A report that President Hoover persuaded the Wickersham commission to abandon a tentative recommendation in favor of revising the 18th amendment was confirmed in an authoritative quarter here tonight.

In this connection it was recalled that Republican state leaders were advised several weeks ago that the commission would report on January 6, but that after several sessions of the commission around that date, a mysterious delay intervened postponing the report for two weeks. No official explanation of this delay has been offered. However, the report and the 11 separate individual reports appeared today all dated Jan. 7.

POWER TO CONGRESS

In final form the commission's recommendations stated that "all the amendment be revised so that it should be made to read substantially as follows," and then the text was given proposing to give congress the right to regulate or to prohibit the liquor traffic instead of making prohibition mandatory as the present amendment does. President Hoover today referred to the commission's proposed revision of the 18th amendment as follows:

Redmond Herd Of Jerseys Tops Oregon List for Year

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, Corvallis, Ore., Jan. 20. (UP)—Ten registered and grade Jerseys owned by R. T. Jackson of Redmond topped the list of 639 herds on test in her improvement associations of this state during 1930 with an average of 1,415 pounds per cow. Figures were compiled by Roger Morse, dairy extension specialist. Jackson's herd is in the Central Oregon association.

THE CHAMPION cow among the 8,296 completing the year's test was a grade Jersey owned by Charles Brothers of Leneve in the Coquille Valley association. She is 6 years old and produced 14,435 pounds of milk containing 600.1 pounds of butterfat.

YAMHILL HIGHEST

OF THE 12 associations completing the year's work, highest honors went to the Yamhill association with 43 herds containing 823 cows on test producing an average of 1,527 pounds of milk and 147.49 pounds of butterfat. Hood River was the runner-up with 19 herds and 112 cows, making an average of 7,012.2 pounds of milk and 244.27 pounds of fat.

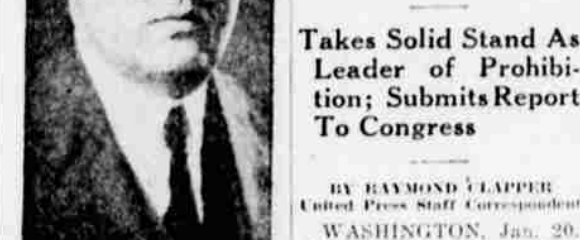

FILIBUSTER HALTS ACTION IN CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20. (UP)—A filibuster on a \$14,000,000 Indian fund passed its third day in the senate today, still going strong, while a new relief plan reached the floor for action and the World Court question came up for another fight.

Congress adjourns six weeks from tomorrow noon, and not one of the appropriation bills necessary to avoid a special session has passed.

Administration leaders, deploring "lack of progress" on the pending interior department appropriation bill, announced today they would try to keep the senate in session tomorrow night until the measure is passed.

It has been filibustered for three days by Senator Elmer Thomas, Democrat, Okla., on a \$13,000,000 Oklahoma Indian item and others who intend to carry on his light tomorrow.

Ellius Root, 85-year old expert on international law, who devised a compromise way of United States entry into the World Court, is behind the renewed court agitation.

Garner Loses In Cash Bonus Try For Hearing Now

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20. (UP)—An attempt by Representative John N. Garner of Texas, democrat, to obtain a hearing on proposals for cash bonuses of the World War veterans certificate was defeated today by a party vote of 72 in 2 in the house ways and means committee.
