### Special Plane Service Will Aid Voyagers

LONDON, Jan. 20. (UP)—Imperial Airways and the White Star Line have completed working arrangements whereby a special airplane may be booked from mid-Atlantic by wireless. It is understood here that similar arrangements may be made between other north Atlantic lines and the Imperial Airways.

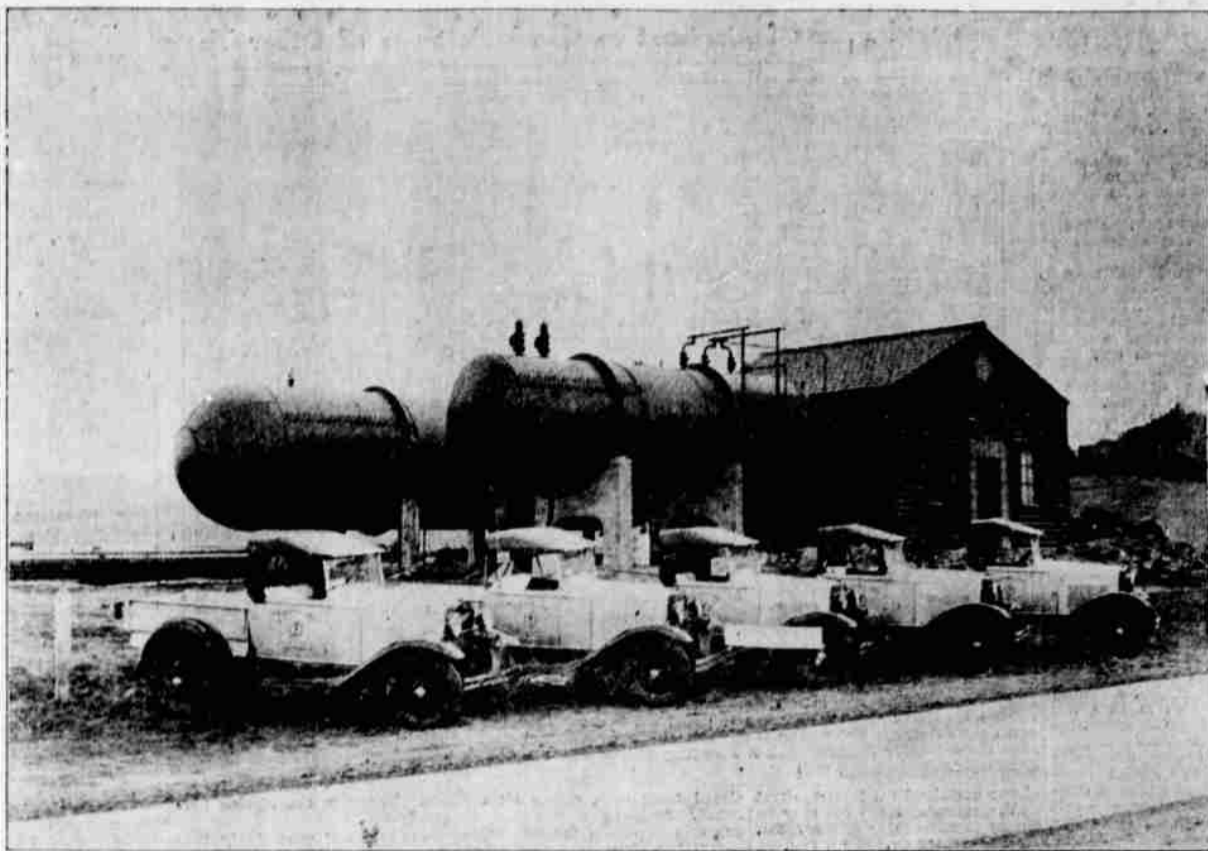
Upon a wireless request from the purser to the Imperial Airways, a passenger arriving at Cherbourg or Southampton will be met by a special airplane.

The plane will conduct the passenger to London, a continental city, or to a connecting point along the India or London-to-Cape Town airways.

This new step is considered by local aviation experts to presage ship-to-land airplane service for both passengers and urgent mail. When this development becomes a reality on both sides of the Atlantic a normal six-day voyage may be reduced from two to three days.

### Col. Anderson's Liquor Control Plan Favored

RICHMOND, Va., Jan. 20. (UP)—Col. Henry W. Anderson's proposed plan of government liquor control "would take profits of two to three billion dollars a year from the pockets of criminals and permit the government to eradicate crime instead of letting the criminal use it to build up crime," Anderson declared here tonight.

Col. Anderson voted individually for revision of the Eighteenth Amendment in the commission's report. "The bootlegger could not compete with governmental control because he couldn't meet its price," Anderson continued. "With the bootlegger eliminated there would be no illicit sales, consequently it would benefit the youth under 21 years

of age because under the plan he could not buy liquor.

"Restrictions around the sale to adults would be sufficient to reduce drinking to a minimum."

"Prohibition has not lessened demand for liquor and never will," he declared. "This must be achieved through a process of education."

### Sloan Leaves For Portland After Fine Talk Here

### Dismisses Suit Against Mix for \$50,000 Damages

NATCHEZ, Miss., Jan. 20. (UP)—Chancellor R. W. Cutrer dismissed today a damage suit for \$50,000 filed against Tom Mix, cowboy movie actor, by Colonel Zack T. Miller, owner of the 191 ranch shows.

Both sides must pay the cost of court, Chancellor Cutrer ruled. Miller's attorney appealed the case, declaring they would take it to the state supreme court immediately.

Mix acknowledged in his testimony that he spoke of going with Miller's Ponca City, Okla., outfit, but maintained he had never signed a contract. His third divorced wife, Mrs. Olive Mix, appeared in Miller's behalf, and provided most of the fireworks in relating alleged escapades of her former husband.

Miller testified Mix had contracted with the 191 Ranch Shows

at \$10,000 a week, but jumped the contract to go with the Sells Photo-circus.
