

### POLICE HALT 'HUNGER MARCH'

#### Confusion Reigns As Gas Buses Wrong Way and Bothers Others

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 20 (UP)—An attempted "hunger march" to the city hall today by 1,000 men, women and children was broken up by police who were forced to use tear gas and force to free for all fights with the more violent of the paraders.

#### RELEASE TEAR GAS

The march occurred in the old business district of Los Angeles. Warned in advance, 200 officers had been stationed at intersections surrounding the 21-story city hall.

As the leaders started the march, a policeman released tear gas. A 30-foot stream of the liquid sprayed the marchers. A change in wind sent the gas back toward the police and they, too, dispersed. Automobile and street car traffic was tied up for blocks and occupants of the vehicles were affected by the gas.

#### DISPERSE MOB

Several sections of the parade attempted to reform. Police cars charged into groups of marchers, scattering them. Screaming and shouting, men and women were dispersed down alleys and into stores.

W. H. Becker, a private detective and brother of a member of the police "Red" squad, lost a finger. An unidentified marcher slashed him with a knife.

S. G. Heaney, an officer, received hospital treatment for head wounds. His opponent, Hector Triana, 22, was overpowered by tear gas. He was charged with assault with a deadly weapon. An hour after the main engagement, Officer W. J. Geyman was punched in both eyes in "guerilla fighting."

### Teacher Shot Five Times but Not Attacked

FORT MOHGAN, Cal., Jan. 20 (UP)—Eldred Marriott, 32-year-old Wiggins, Cal., school teacher, was shot five times before her body was thrown into a river irrigation canal, near here, on a dispute over a body of water.

The body was found frozen almost solidly in the ice of the canal late yesterday, and before the autopsy could be performed. Coroner L. H. Facer had to wait more than 24 hours for it to thaw. The body had been entombed in the frozen ditch a little more than two months.

The body bore no marks of violence, the examination revealed. Officers advanced the theory that Miss Marriott was shot by a local hood. A coroner's inquest will be held Thursday morning.

Harry E. Moore, charged with abducting Miss Marriott, was released on \$2,000 bond late today. The case against him, Sheriff Rufus Johnson said, was purely circumstantial. His preliminary hearing has been set for Jan. 28.

### Society Woman Locked in Home, Jewels Stolen

HILLSBOROUGH, Calif., Jan. 20 (UP)—Locked in a closet of her home here, Mrs. Richard Van Sooner, Pasadena society woman, heard robbers going thru the house and escaping with \$10,000 in jewelry and furs today.

A man and a woman took the bell and a maid answered. The maid and Mrs. Van Sooner were rushed into the closet where they could get a good look at the intruders.

Mrs. Van Sooner thought, however, that the woman acted like a former servant in her home.

The pair escaped in her automobile. Van Sooner is president of the Consolidated Milling company in San Francisco.

### Shovel Opens Up Highway Slide Near Seaside

ASTORIA, Jan. 20 (UP)—A steam shovel today succeeded in opening a path in the rock and dirt slides which blocked the Roosevelt highway south of Seaside large enough to permit one-way traffic.

Workers on the road said that it would probably be several days before the work of clearing away the 200 yards of slide material would be finished.

It was announced by the company that plants and distribution systems will soon be completed in numerous other Oregon towns including La Grande, Coquille, Bend and Cottage Grove, with many others to be started during the early part of 1931.

The story was told by Anna McDowell, superintendent of an apartment house in which Bairnsfather and Mrs. Collier are alleged to have stayed as "Mr. and Mrs. Bruce." Decision in the case has been reserved by Justice Glendon.

### Human Bondage In Liberia Hit By United States

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20 (UP)—Willingness of the United States to share in an international effort to wipe out human bondage in the African republic of Liberia, was announced today by the state department.

Aroused by a recent international report on Liberian slavery, the department has been carrying on conversations with five world powers to plan "affirmative international co-operation" in effecting reforms recommended by a United States-league of nations commission of inquiry. These talks have been held here between Secretary of State Stimson and Assistant Secretary Castle, on the one hand, and envoys of Great Britain, France, Germany, Italy, and Japan, on the other.

Meanwhile, the state department has exchanged a series of notes with Liberia, but is dissatisfied thus far with assurances of reform given it by that country. An international machinery set up in Liberia probably would be devised by the United States and the league of nations, it was learned. It is anticipated here that the European members of the league with whom the state department has talked, will take up the matter with the Geneva secretariat.

### Head of Yankee Division is Ill

BOSTON, Jan. 20 (UP)—Major General Clarence F. Ivers, World War leader of the 26th (Yankee) division, suffered a slight relapse at Massachusetts General Hospital here tonight.

In a bulletin issued late tonight, the 71-year-old veteran was reported "resting comfortably although his condition appeared weaker than that of last night."

General Edwards entered the hospital last Thursday and underwent an emergency operation for a serious intestinal disorder.

Guaymas is a port of Mexico, at the mouth of the Rio de Guaymas. The tremors were the third earthquake registered in Mexico in the last 10 days.
