In any event, if nothing happens to either Marcus or Pothier before they step into the ring Friday evening, those fans who journey over to Merrill are due to see one of the fastest main events staged in Klamath county in a long time. It will be a fight well worth seeing.

### TO NAME PLAYERS

The names of all players must be in at the meeting Wednesday night. A limit of 10 players a team has been set by the league officials and not less than six.
