Whitney Horse Favored to Win Grand National
 NEW YORK, Jan. 20 (UP)—Jock Whitney's Easter Hero has been established as the winter favorite for the Grand National at Aintree, according to word received today from London.

This great horse is now being quoted at 6 to 100 against. Assuming that he stands up under the training until the day of the race the odds will narrow to something like 25 to 100, British experts believe.

Despite the successful campaign to reduce the size of the entry list, one of the largest fields in the history of the British racing feature is expected to face the barrier on the day of the race, March 27.

It is not believed, however, that the number of starters will be as great as in 1929 when 66, a record number, competed. That race was won by Greengage, a 100 to 1 shot.

Nitschelm and Moore Ranked High in Nation
 Records compiled by the American Trapshooters Association reveal two Klamath Falls shooters at the top in two of the five divisions for 1930.

Charles L. Moore of this city topped the shooters of the nation in the 1930 handicap division with a percentage of .9427 on 500 targets.

E. Nitschelm, another Klamath Falls man, took honors in the 1000 to 1500 target class, shooting for an average of .9165 on 1500 targets.

E. F. Woodward of Houston, Texas, heads the list of the nation's trapshooters with an average of .9905 for the year 1929, and the longest run of targets on record, 695 without a miss.

KANSAS CITY
 KANSAS CITY, Jan. 20, (UP)—Hogs advanced 10 cents today on the Kansas City livestock market while cattle held steady and sheep sold generally lower after a sensational rise yesterday.
 Steers sold from \$7.50 @ 9.50, and yearlings from \$8 @ 10; top fat hogs were up to \$8 and the bulk of sales ranged from \$7 @ 7.95. Best lambs sold from \$8 @ 8.50, and feeding lambs from \$7 @ 7.75.

Improvement Units Paid Up Well in City
 Collections on improvement units in the city of Klamath Falls were better during the year 1930 than ever before in the history of the town, official reports state. During the months of November and December, collections of the 82nd improvement unit, comprising the Mills Addition paying project, totaled \$27,000, an unusually high collection on recently completed work.

All city dockets are in good shape, and the process of foreclosing on properties delinquent for more than one year in improvement assessments has begun. The city is also following up delinquencies within 20 days after the property goes on the delinquent list.

Reports which will show exact delinquencies in each unit are being compiled by the city.

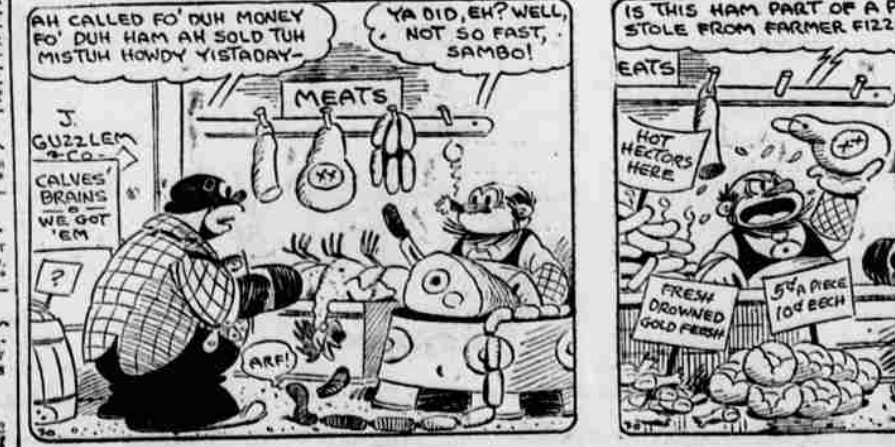
