Kerns Vice President and Campbell Treasurer Of Board

R. E. Bradbury, who for the past few years has been an ardent worker and supporter of the Klamath county fair, was elected president of the Klamath county fair board yesterday at the annual election of officers held in the county agent's office.

Bradbury fills the place left vacant by E. M. Hammond, who resigned his duties as president to other work at the irrigation district to which he was recently elected director.

A. R. Campbell of Pine Grove, well known Klamath county rancher, was elected a member of the board to fill the vacancy created by Hammond's resignation. It was announced by Leda E. Parker, secretary of the fair board.

Results of the annual election made R. E. Bradbury, president, serving another term in that capacity; J. W. Kerns of Klamath Falls, vice-president; A. R. Campbell of Pine Grove, treasurer; and Leda E. Parker, executive secretary to the fair board.

Mrs. Parker will serve her second year as manager of the fair and will be employed in a purely executive position. She will be assisted prior and during the fair in the arrangement of books and other detail work attendant to the fair.

It was announced yesterday that Klamath county will have two booths at outside exhibitions this year, one at the state fair held annually at Salem, the other at the Pacific International Livestock show at Portland. Klamath was not represented at either exhibition in 1930, and it is a step forward in the advertising of Klamath county, that Klamath should have a fitting number of outside exhibitions during the coming year.

Institutions Important in People's Lives

"What are the three most important institutions in the building of citizens for the state?" This question was asked and answered last night by Dr. Kellems at the First Christian church.

He was discussing the relation of the church to the future welfare of a man and his family. "There can be but one answer to this question on the part of any thinking man," he continued. "The three institutions which go hand-in-hand in the building of citizenship are the home, the school and the church."

"I have seen a great change in thinking of men concerning democracy since my own university days."

"This was when we in our patriotic pride in our own great democratic institutions thought that all men the world over would soon come to the democratic ideal. But we have modified our enthusiasm in this direction. Time has worked havoc with our theories and we have seen the iron rule of dictatorship grow because the majority of the world is not ready for democracy."

"A democratic state presupposes a highly educated citizenry, men of intelligence and honesty. Only with such men can democracy government long prevail. And the education of these

citizens must begin in the home. The kind of government in the home will go far to determine what the future citizen will be in the school and in the affairs of his after life."

Tonight Dr. Kellems is to preach the most important sermon of the entire evangelistic campaign: "The Battle Over the Empty Grave," or "Did Jesus Arise from the Dead?" This is one of Dr. Kellems' published sermons and it has been heard and read in many parts of the world.

DR. KELLEMS LAUDS COAST

Describes Alaskan Trip At Chamber of Commerce Luncheon

"In no part of the world is so much beauty crammed together as there is on the Pacific coast, from San Diego to Alaska," said Dr. Jesse Kellems in his talk on "The Future of Alaska," at the forum of the chamber of commerce yesterday.

Dr. Kellems, introduced by Rev. Arthur B. Eaton in a witty manner, related the adventures of the Kellems family in their recent trip to Alaska. Dr. Kellems stated that he had considered calling his address on Alaska, "Landingsiders adrift," as they made the trip in a gasoline yacht from Olympia, Wash., to Skagway, Alaska, without any previous experience in navigation.

Many interesting anecdotes of the trip were related by Dr. Kellems, including the rescue of two youths, each with a wooden leg, who were adrift in a canoe in Puget Sound. Beauties of the trip to Skagway were described by the speaker in vivid terms, and interesting, intimate and humorous sidelights of the trip were included in his talk.

He spoke at length on the possibilities of future industrial development of Alaska, and predicted that before many years this territory will be one of the great wealthy states of the American commonwealth.

The remainder of the forum hour was turned over to Dr. Homer Kellems, who showed beautiful lantern slides of the Alaskan trip. The pictures were all snapped by a small kodak, and were finished by Dr. Kellems himself. An interesting feature of the picture program was a series of totem poles photographed in a cemetery in a small Canadian village.

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
