**Gilmore Stages
Economy Run for
Women Drivers**

For the third successive year
the Gilmore Oil company is stag-
ing an official economy run for
women drivers exclusively. The
run this year will be from Los
Angeles to Wrightwood moun-
tains, a distance of 200 miles by
a circuitous route down the coast
and thence into the mountains.

"Our previous economy run
created such widespread com-
ment that we concluded to have
another this year, on Friday,
February 13," says Earl B. Gil-
more, president of the Gilmore
company. "It is a fitting day and
date for the contestants to settle
once and for all their supersti-
tions about luck or lack of luck."

"Practically the same route
and rules that were effective last
year will be adopted this year.
The event will again be held un-
der the sanction and supervision
of the contest board of the Ameri-
can Automobile association as a
stock car run and the results will
be accorded national recognition.
All details of the contest are en-
tirely in the hands of A. A. A.
officials from start to finish.

"There will be a revision of

Shows Moderate
Temperatures**

A survey of the monthly
temperature report of the United
states reclamation service for
1930 showed that Klamath Falls
enjoyed an average maximum
temperature of 74 degrees and an
average minimum of 23 de-
grees.

The highest monthly average
for the year occurred in July with
95 degrees and the lowest mini-
mum was in January with an
average of 7 degrees below zero.

The average range in temper-
atures were: January 47, high,
-7 low; February 65 high, 5 low;
March, 69 and 15; April, 74 and
27; May, 77 and 37; June, 97
and 31; July, 99 and 45; Aug-
ust, 91 and 42; September, 59
and 27; October, 72 and 23;
November, 64 and 10; Decem-
ber, 49 and 11.
