

KELLEMS TO REMAIN WEEK

Extend Great Revival For Fourth Week; Sunday To Be Big Day

The third week of the Kellems brothers' meetings at the First Christian church came to a close last night with interest and enthusiasm at a high point. Last night was the largest week night audience that has attended any of the meetings.

There has been a steady growth in the services from the first week until last night, when the peak of interest was reached. During the week there have been baptismal services at the close of the nightly meetings and already a large number of people have taken membership with the First Christian church.

SUNDAY BIG DAY

Sunday is to be a great day. Because of the intense interest in the services it has been decided to continue the meetings for another week. On Sunday the Sunday school is planning for 300 present. At the morning service Dr. Kellems will preach his sermon on the theme, "The Meaning of the Lord's Supper." At the evening meeting he will preach on "Christian Unity."

In announcing this plan, Dr. Kellems said: "There is no question of more vital importance today than the question of the unity of the church. Contrary to what some people are thinking, the American church is not getting smaller. Many smaller sects are dying out or are merging with the great denominations, but the whole trend

of American Christianity today is towards consolidation—unity.

"I do not know any of the great leaders in the modern church who are not heart and hand with the cause of Christian unity. But the big question is that of how this is to be accomplished. Of course such a wonderful victory as that of church unity will not be won without a lot of hard work and a great deal of patience. But that it will come is as sure as that we believe in the great foundations of faith. It is up to every one who loves God to work and pray for the spirit of unity to grow in the world over."

In preparation for his sermon of Sunday night Dr. Kellems preached last evening on the theme, "The Church of the New Testament." It was one of the most powerful and effective messages he has thus far delivered in Klamath Falls. The special number of music was a duet by Dr. Homer Kellems and Mrs. Kellems.
