Mr. and Mrs. Timothy Sullivan are the parents of a son born Tuesday, January 13.

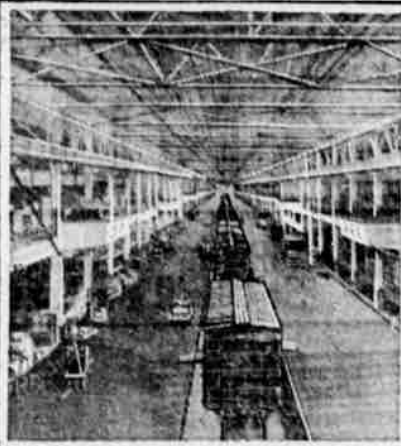
### Forest Service Builds Road to Sconchin Butte

ALTURA, Jan. 24.—A road crew, employed by the U. S. forest service, is employed in the construction of a short road to Sconchin butte and Symbol Bridge cave, and will have the project, which is two miles in length, completed within two weeks.

The new road leaves the Lyons road near Shell cave in the center of the Lava Beds national monument and provides easy access to many wonderful caves which have hitherto been accessible only by foot travel. The Painted cave will also be made accessible by auto by means of this road.

Both Big Painted cave and Symbol Bridge derive their names from the many Indian writings with which the entrances and walls are adorned. The cave of the Modoc Lava Beds region were used for human habitation by Indian tribes for centuries before the coming of the first white men to the country.

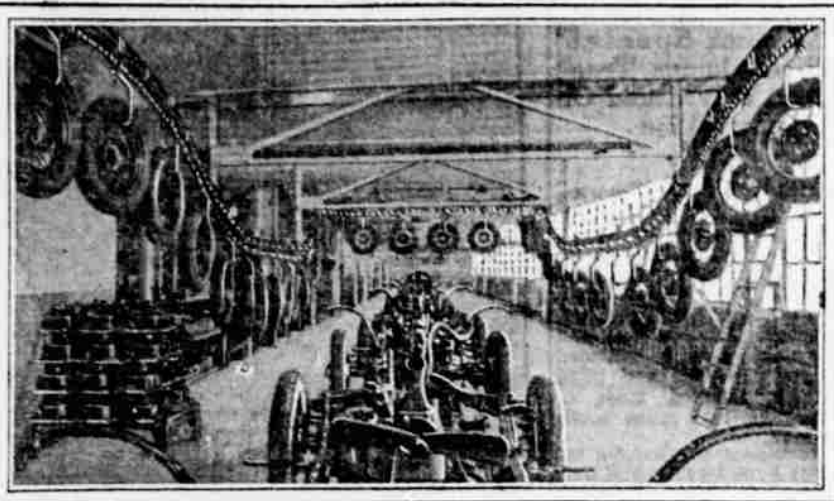
## Conveyors Carry Ford Car Parts

The highly important part played by conveyor systems in all Ford Motor Company manufacturing and assembly plants is graphically shown in the above three pictures taken in the recently opened Edgewater, N. J., plant. One of the pictures shows how parts may be unloaded from freight cars within the plant only a few feet from the various assembly lines. Another picture shows automobile bodies starting their trip on a conveyor while the third view is of the conveyor system used to bring wheels to the chassis which are also moving on a conveyor. As indicated in the picture, a constant flow of wheels on which the tires have already been mounted moves around and over the chassis assembly line. As a chassis enters the section, workers, in groups of four, each take a wheel from the hooks and fasten it to the chassis.
