

ROAD DREAMS COME TRUE IN MODOC

Malin Highway Money Will be Appropriated By Legislature

ALTURAS, (Modoc Co.) Jan. 24.—The dream of road booster of this place has come true. The enactment last week of Congressmen Harry L. Knight and that funds had been appropriated for the construction of a highway from Alturas to Malin, Oregon was followed by the news from C. H. Sweetser, district engineer of the bureau of public roads this week, that construction work on the project would commence within the next few weeks.

The project really starts from Canby and extends approximately forty-five miles northwest to a point on the California-Oregon line southeast of Malin, Oregon where it connected with the Oregon state highway. That portion of the road from this point to Canby is already California state highway. It is understood that \$100,000.00 is immediately available for the work.

A good many years ago the Oregon state highway commission built a macadamized state highway to the California-Oregon line, on the edge of the Tule lake valley with a connection road would be built from Alturas. The condition of the road in Modoc county, a road built for the most part during the Modoc Indian war of 1872-73 is such that all of the northwestern part of the county practically cut off from the county seat so far as highway travel is concerned for several months in the year. All of the road is passable the year around except about 25 miles running through pine timber.

The Alturas-Malin highway was surveyed last summer by the bureau of public roads. Modoc county contributing \$10,000.00 towards the work. The route practically follows the Southern Pacific railway all the way from Canby to Cornhill. In spite of its rough condition it has carried a heavy volume of travel for the past several summers.

Dairy Products Being Displayed By Association

A display of "Challenge" dairy products, made by the creamery of the Klamath Dairyman's association, has been placed in the chamber of commerce for this week.

FARM PRICES TAKE DROPS

Small Grains Advance Over Fall Levels; But Most Products Decline

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 24. (UP)—On December 15, for the first time in 15 years, the general level of farm prices dropped below the pre-war average, it was shown in a survey issued by L. R. Brethaupt, extension economist of Oregon state college.

GREATEST declines were registered in eggs, butterfat, hogs and cotton. Brethaupt said. Apples, flaxseed and most small grains made slight advances from November 15 to December 15. It was indicated.

RATIO DROPS
THE RATIO between prices received and prices paid by farmers dropped two points to 65 per cent of the pre-war average, the report said.

ACCORDING to a farm price table, Oregon farmers were getting better than average prices for some crops during December than in 11 western states and the nation.

AVERAGE HIGH
EXCEPTING wheat which was selling at eight-tenths of a cent lower here than in other western states, grains were selling from 25.1 cents for corn to 9.2 cents higher for oats in Oregon.

THE AVERAGE was equal to high over the remainder of the nation. Potatoes did not show so much profit however, being only 85 cents a bushel here as compared to 66.7 in other western states and \$9.9 cent in the national average.

HOGS AND CATTLE prices were higher at \$8.50 and \$6.50 here as compared to \$7.44 for average hogs and \$6.37 for beef. Sheep and lambs were lower here however by a few cents and \$3.00, respectively.

POULTRY LOWER
POULTRY prices generally ranged on an average of one cent per pound lower in Oregon than in 11 western states but one cent higher than in the nation.

EGGS SOLD for three and two cents less while butter was 24

cents as compared to 34.7 in 11 states and 34.8 in the nation.

HAY AND alfalfa was from \$1 to \$2 per ton less here but was higher than in 11 states and lower by \$3 than for the nation.

APPLES ranged from three to nine cents less per bushel. The price in Oregon was 80 cents, 10 cents higher than a month previous but 25 cents lower than the same time last year.
