DAILY CAPITOL NEWS LETTER

It is to be as modern as tomorrow. AVIATION has been made immeasurably safer through application of weather forecasting. AND FOR ALL of this, each man, woman and child in the United States pays only the price of a two cent postage stamp, annually.

PORTLAND OFFICE
AT PORTLAND, the weather bureau is presided over by Edward L. Wells, senior meteorologist in charge.

THAT OFFICE is responsible for the proper exposure of meteorological instruments at about 125 substations in Oregon, for gathering, verifying, filing, and publishing reports from these stations, for distribution of weather forecasts and warnings within the state, for keeping records of river stages throughout the entire Columbia river drainage basin, and issuing river forecasts and flood warnings; and for the issue of specific weather forecasts for Portland and vicinity.

MANY DUTIES
IT RECEIVES and transmits information relative to the movements of ships in and out of the Columbia river. It issues a daily weather map showing weather conditions over the United States, Canada, Alaska, and the northern Pacific ocean. Through a branch station at the Portland municipal airport, it supplies air pilots with forecasts and reports of weather conditions along the airways, including wind directions and velocities in the upper air.

LOCAL STATIONS, with trained full-time men in charge, are in operation, also at Baker, Medford and Roseburg.

SIX INSTRUMENTS
SIX PRINCIPAL instruments are used at the Portland bureau for predictions. They are: thermometers, barometers, snow and rain gauges, anemometers, and a small rubber balloon.

THE THERMOMETERS, one common, one which is hooked up to a recording device, to keep a

record, and a maximum and a minimum thermometer which after reaching their extremes each 24 hours, stay at that point until readjusted, give the temperatures.

BAROMETERS make it possible to predict the movement of high and low pressure areas, which cause storms.

ANEMOMETERS measure the velocity of the wind. THE BALLOONS are released daily, filled with hydrogen, and their course followed and charted through a theodolite, and instrument used in surveying. By this method, the direction and velocity of wind at various levels is determined.

THE INSTRUMENTS, the anemometer and rain gauge, in addition to a sunshine recorder which keeps a record of the minutes of sunshine each day and a wind vane, which indicates the direction of the wind, are hooked up to recording device known as a meteorograph, so that records are kept of various weather phenomena.

THE WHOLE stock in trade of the weather forecaster would fit on an ordinary dining room table—and there still would be room left to eat around the edges.

'Tomorrow' Is Topic Tonight Of Dr. Kellems

Tonight Dr. Kellems will speak on the theme "Tomorrow" at the First Christian church. The meetings, because of interest which has been manifested from the start, will continue for the rest of this week. Next Sunday will be the last Sunday of the campaign. This week will be the greatest and best of the series and it is expected that there will be more people added to the church during all the rest of the meetings.

In his sermon last night on the unusual theme "A Lawyer's Defense of Judas" Dr. Kellems said in part: "Some of you are today who condemn Judas because he betrayed our Lord. And no one likes a betrayer. There is hardly anyone as low as the man who betrays his trust. But we shall remember that Judas did not have the evidence men have today. He did not know what we consider as Christians to be the crowning evidence of all—the resurrection of Jesus from the dead." Then, too, Judas was a Jew and like all the Jews of his

day he looked for a King who should smother Rome and set his people free. And from this standpoint Jesus was very much a disappointment. He did not measure up at all to the ideal which Judas had of the one who should come as the savior of his people. Instead of building an army and navy with which to strike the Romans, Jesus had come preaching great sermons and talking what to Judas and those with him were but platitudes.

"But if we condemn Judas what attitude have we toward the modern traitor. And how many of them there are in Klamath Falls. There are hundreds of people here who were once good Christians. They worked in the church, they were interested in divine things. But they have come to this city and have left God out of all their thinking and their lives have been lived without Him. The man who betrays Jesus today is a hundred times worse a traitor than Judas ever dared to be. He had excuse, the modern traitor has none."
