

COPCO REPORT SHOWS GROWTH, PAY DIVIDEND

Grant Pass Sub-Station Done; Open Dunsmuir Office; Plan Keno Dam

The completion of the new Grants Pass substation, the building of the new regulating dam at Keno on the Klamath river and other important Copco construction items are covered in the quarterly report to shareholders recently released by the California-Oregon Power company. The report with which was enclosed the regular quarterly dividend on Copco preferred stock indicates that considerable construction activity has been engaged in by the local utility during the past three months period with more to follow as soon as approved. Much progress has been noted, particularly in the construction of rural lines to serve additional house and farms in the rural sections of Southern Oregon and Northern California.

The following paragraphs are quoted from the Copco report: CONSTRUCTION

The Grants Pass substation which was started November 1931 has just been completed and placed in actual operation. This new and modern addition to the company's properties occupies a desirable location just outside the city limits and adjacent to the C. and O. C. railroad. The completion of this new substation will permit the improvement of present voltage conditions on line 7, which extends from the Gold Bay generating station to Grants Pass, through an increase in capacity from 24,000 to 66,000 volts.

It is also expected that betterment of service conditions on the Glendale and Wilderville lines will result from the addition of automatic reclosing oil circuit-breakers in the regulating dam. The completion of the Grants Pass substation assures ample capacity and dependable service to take care of the steadily increasing needs of the territory in and about this thriving community in accordance with the well-known Copco policy, local labor and materials were used to the greatest possible extent in building this new project.

REGULATING DAM
Many new line extensions were constructed in the rural districts during the past quarter, a considerable number of farms being electrified before the advent of winter.

An important new project scheduled for early construction is the building of a regulating dam at Keno on the Klamath river. This new dam, which will be approximately 450 feet long and 3 feet high, is expected to add materially in regulating the flow of the river between Klamath Falls and Keno. This should prove of considerable benefit, not only to the company's operations but to the farming and logging activities in that section of Klamath county.

NEW BUSINESS
The splendid prune crop of Douglas county has been responsible for a substantial connected load to supply the many electric prune driers in the Umpqua division during the drying season. A large majority of the progressive prune growers in this vicinity are now employing the latest modern electrical methods in preparing local prunes for market.

The new and modern street lighting system in the city of Klamath Falls was completed and placed in active service early last fall. In addition, quite a few additional ornamental standards have been installed on the side streets and in front of enterprising business houses as a result of this up-to-date lighting system. A new lighting system. A new street lighting system was also recently installed in the business district of the town of Dorris, California.

DUNSMUIR OFFICE
In order to render the best possible service to our customers, the Dunsmuir, California office was recently moved to a new location next door to the post office. The new building is for appliances as well as for all office purposes.

The location, which is one of the best in the city is expected to greatly facilitate the transaction of the company's business in the Dunsmuir district.

PREFERRED STOCK
The company's investment department has been successful in distributing over 2,500 shares of 6 per cent preferred stock in the territory served during October, November and December. It is interesting to note that repurchases by the Securities company during this period were considerably less than a year ago.

Several hundred new names have been added to the company's fast growing list of stockholders. Money received from stock sales can be invested only on improvements and additions to the company's system, thus providing adequate facilities for an essential service to Southern Oregon and Northern California communities.

AT THE PELICAN

"Safety Last," that great Harold Lloyd classic of the art of thrilling movie audiences, was made seven years ago, but it is still in demand, and there are few who can forget the breath-taking situations when Lloyd dangled by his fingertips from the hands of a clock 12 stories in mid-air. The thrill of "Safety Last" seemed for a long time impossible to surpass or even equal. Even Lloyd himself abandoned the idea of doing more thrilling thrill scenes.

But several months ago, while scouting for a new idea for "Feet First," now showing at the Pelican theatre, Lloyd hit upon a scheme which when developed offered what he feels has been his greatest opportunity for presenting spine-tingling entertainment. This is another scrap-actor angle, but different from anything that has gone before.

And it is plain to those who have previewed this picture, and audience at the Pelican theatre since the opening of "Feet First," that these new thrills begin where "Safety Last" left off. It is a nerve-wracker, if ever there was one.

Although Lloyd had thought it impossible to equal "Safety Last," he had not reckoned on his own imaginative and creative genius. He made the thrill scenes, which come toward the end of "Feet First," at great personal risk, spending several months at work which required him to swing by his hands in precarious poses. Without his physical physique he could never have accomplished such feats. But the work was so arduous that this time it seems likely he will let "Feet First" stand as his high mark for exciting thrills and will now leave it to the rest of the film industry to try to equal his exploits.

Although "Feet First" has been "cut" down to the conventional 8,000 feet or so of the usual feature length, the film organization "shot" a total of 242,239 feet of film in making it. This is approximately 60 miles of celluloid, and is believed to constitute a record in screenland.

AT THE PINE TREE
When photoplay fans of the greater new show world of eye and ear diversion think of sophistication with dignity, delineation of delicate diction without smirk, and finesse in characterization ranging from gutter to ballroom, they think of "Safety Last," which comes to mind.

That is the famous pair of "Charming Sinners," and "The Laughing Lady," Ruth Chatterton and Olive Brook, newly and brilliantly appointed by Paramount in its premier engagement as a dialogue picture, now at the Pine Tree theatre.

Of course you've heard of the author, Gouverneur Morris; like you recall the story as "The Better Wife." And certainly you've heard of Mr. Law's lady directorial prodigy, Dorothy Arzner. Miss Arzner has accomplished another "Sarah and Son," which may have been made easy through the literary assistance of Zoe Atkins, who wrote the screen play, a duty she acquitted also for "Sarah."

The plot is a highly polished treatment of situations and manners. Brook, suavely eloquent in the flick of a cigarette ash, is a man of standing, devoted by his wife. Slightly perturbed and on the loose, he meets Chatterton, show-girl at liberty following the close of production in a decency crusade. Several hours later Brook finds himself married to her, and in true sportsmanship lives up to the contract. He is attracted by his friends, only a wealthy client continuing cordial relations; this, for a purpose disclosed later at a party in which Chatterton is the only woman guest. Certain advances made at the gathering, Brook's attitude toward the conduct of his wife and benefactor, the reappearance of his first mistress and the adjustment indicating happiness under approved relations, constitute a climax that gives everybody's woman and everybody's man, red meat for thought.

AT THE RAINBOW
Swinging his sombrero and shouting with joy, "The Texan" comes galloping into town today.

at the Rainbow theatre, "The Texan," himself, is Gary Cooper, star of the great outdoor talking romance of the West, "The Virginian." Again he brings the thrills and spectacle and daring romance of the big open spaces to this town. "The Texan" is Paramount's new talking Western epic, usually high due to the existence in Klamath Falls of automobile retailers who are also large distributors.

With Fay Wray as his leading woman, Cooper interprets the true spirit of the plains. As the Liano Kid, a young, dare-devil rural, he accepts the proposal of a crooked gambler to go to South America and there pose as the long-lost son of a wealthy and aristocratic widow. In the pampas country of South America, he meets the beautiful niece of the charming and lovable old lady, and falls in love with her. Unable to rob the old lady and her niece, he fights to escape his bargain with the gambler.

There is action and great drama in this story, which is adapted from a stirring O. Henry tale, "A Double-Dyed Deceiver." It is produced on a big scale in a tremendously spectacular outdoor locale. The interesting days of pioneer Texas are authentically planned in the opening scenes, and the curious customs of Spanish love-making are seen in detail in the South American setting. A biting touch of humor keeps the entertainment on a thoroughly enjoyable plane.

Pastor Attacks Delay in Duty In Fine Sermon

"One of the saddest things in this fine city is the fact that thousands of good people move here and leave their religion in the old home. They are like the little girl who the night before she and her parents left the east, knelt down and prayed: 'Good-bye God, we are going to California in the morning.' If the unidentified former church members of Klamath Falls would line up with their churches we would see the Christian life of this city doubled."

Tonight Dr. Kellems will preach on a startling theme: "What the Minister Hears in the Homes of Klamath Falls."

FRENCH TELLS ABOUT ORIENT

distributing field by five executives of the company.

Oriental countries have experienced the business depression with the rest of the world, Mr. French stated. They are becoming more nationalistic in their policies and are favoring the sales of their own merchandise to the exclusion of foreign products more than ever.

BLAME TARIFF
"The Orientals blame the United States for their predicament rather than the general depression. The tariff, they believe, has retarded their business," Mr. French said.

"I asked where they got the lumber which they use to build their houses and buildings and they said Washington and Oregon," he stated.

PENALIZE CARS
Japan penalizes the owners of cars and 85 per cent of the vehicles are public carriers, while only 15 per cent are individually owned, Mr. French stated. In Tokyo the license for a car costs \$230 a year, while in Kobe it costs \$200 a year. The Japanese dislike motor vehicles and under the law before an auto can pass a pedestrian the horn must be sounded.

"Taxis have two drivers, a driver and an assistant driver who blows the horn. When the assistant driver becomes tired of pressing the horn he changes hands. They have to use the horn so often they cannot use electric horns and use the old bulb horns," Mr. French said.

USES ONLY ENGLISH
I toured the Orient without finding any difficulty in using anything but English. Mr. French said, adding that even though the older Orientals may be unable to speak English, compulsory education forces the children to learn it.

"Kidnaping is a sport in China," he stated, and told of the Richfield representative in Shanghai, a well known man who was kidnaped. On the road the kidnaping party met a detective who was in disguise as a beggar to capture smugglers. The detective was paid enough to a revolution war lord, and who recognized the kidnaped man. The detective notified authorities who sent troops and rescued the kidnaped one.

KIDNAPING COSTS
A short time later the man who had been kidnaped received a letter from his abductors asking that he pay them two thousand Mexican dollars, about \$6,000 American money, for their unsuccessful venture.

They pointed out that they had been in considerable expense, that they had to support their families, their grandparents and posterity and that they knew he was an honorable man.

Asked by Mr. French if he paid them the merchant replied that he did, of course. The merchant showed the letter and papers to prove his story.

MERCHANTISING
Mr. French found that in China and Japan the Orientals were growing their carts with little bottles of thin oil. He called his company of the situation. Results: axle grease was shipped over with advertising pamphlets bearing a Japanese or Chinese message reading: "The Richfield axle grease makes the load pull easier."

The merchants retailing the grease secured ocean shells and sold the grease by the shell for greasing the carts.

Former Kaiser Reaches Age 78, Is Well, Hearty

POORH, Holland, Jan. 27. (U.P.)—William, Hohenzollern, ex-king of Prussia, celebrated his 78th birthday today quietly with members of his family and few guests.

The former emperor looked extremely well and hearty. He was cheerful as he received congratulations and gifts, and had a cheery word for each.

His years in exile—he fled Germany during the revolution in 1918 which cost him his throne—had apparently set light on him. He has been graver than in the troubled days of the World war, but he has remained in good physical condition by constant exercise at the estate around his castle.
