Residents Oppose Mead's Idea About Beautifying Canal

Journal Editorial on 'Klamath's River Avon' Brings Many Caustic Comments

An editorial which appeared in the Tuesday morning edition of the Oregon Journal, entitled, "Klamath's River Avon," was causing much caustic comment in Klamath Falls yesterday, as it concerned the tunneling of the government irrigation canal which winds through the city, a project which has the approval of practically every resident in this city.

The editorial states: "Dr. Mead, the headlines say, frowns on the idea of a roof for the irrigation canal in Klamath Falls town. Dr. Mead is commissioner of the United States reclamation service."

"Along with his frown, perhaps Dr. Mead has given an idea to the advocates of a Klamath Falls beautiful. The banks of the canal he suggests, might be lined with trees and flowers. The surface of the canal might be dotted in the summer with pleasure craft and in the winter with devotees of skating and ice hockey. Instead of permitting the canal to be covered away in darkness like something unclean, as New Orleans at an expense of several million dollars has just covered its Canal street, Dr. Mead thinks the Klamath Falls irrigation canal should be something clean, open and beautiful."

"The proposal from the head of the reclamation service brings memory of a New Zealand stream. It is the river Avon that flows through Christchurch. It might be an open sewer, its banks infested with tin cans, dead rats and garbage. Instead it is a river through a continuous park. Although human life is congested nearby, the Avon is clean."

"Several years ago a group of women in the city planted some trees along the banks of the canal, but they received no encouragement from the government and the trees finally died for lack of irrigation. It has been used for a dumping ground, making it filthy. If there had even been a good fence constructed it might have kept a few cars out, but I doubt if it could have kept children out. I can't see that it ever could be made a stream of beauty and I think Mr. Mead would find a great deal of antagonism among residents of the city should he talk to them on the matter."

Charles Wood Eberlein, prominent resident of Klamath Falls and a large property owner, was of the absolute opinion that the canal should be covered as far as the Altamont bridge, pointing out that the tremendous seepage of water into Mills Addition has been the cause of much disease besides starting several damage suits. He went on to say:

"The protection of the people demands that this ditch be covered and before the city can experience all the progress which is its due the people must insist on this improvement of the government to eliminate a constant danger. It has already taken a toll of 19 lives, and it will go on taking its toll unless it is placed under cover."

These expressions were similar to those heard every day whenever the canal is mentioned. At present there is a \$200,000 appropriation bill before congress for this project, but many feel that this amount would hardly be a start.

Swedish Pilot Of Noble Fame Dies After Crash

STOCKHOLM, Jan. 27. (UP)—Stockholm and all Sweden were plunged into the deepest mourning tonight when news of the death of the nation's outstanding aviator, Elmer Lundborg, swept through the nation.

Lundborg, fatally injured when his airplane crashed at Malmoe, Sweden today died later in a hospital. His life had been despaired of from the moment he was taken from the field, crushed and suffering a brain concussion.

Sweden's air hero gained world wide fame in 1925, when he searched the upper reaches of Arctic fields for the stranded party of General Umberto Nobile, the Italian whose expedition in the Italia had ended so disastrously on the ice floes.
