MEAD AGAINST CANAL BILL

Says City to Blame and Is for Beautification Of Entire Route

Suggestions for the beautification of the irrigation canal which winds for three and one-half miles through the city of Klamath Falls, establishing a pleasing outlook of shrubbery and parkways, in lieu of junk and dead ends, are made by Dr. Ewood Mead, commissioner of reclamation, in a lengthy letter to Senator Thomas of Idaho, chairman of the irrigation committee.

The transformation plan, all at the expense of Klamath Falls, is brought forth by Dr. Mead, because of Senator Steiwer's bill providing that the government put the canal underground by construction of a tunnel, and thereby allay the complaints of citizens that the open canal is dangerous, unsightly and unsanitary.

BLAMES CITY

Dr. Mead does not take kindly to Steiwer's idea. Klamath Falls and not the government should pay, he argues, because Klamath Falls has caused most of the trouble by spreading. In 1902, when the reclamation service built the canal, it ran only half a mile through the town, and the place had only 1800 people. Canal problems are local, he avers, and should be solved at the expense of the community. He estimates the cost of a tunnel at \$375,000, as against the \$200,000 proposed to be authorized by the Steiwer bill.

The canal would be a joy to the people, summer and winter, he claims, and would be a description of a visit to Damascus and an experience he had there.

'SPRING' OVER MOST OF U. S.

Bulbs Sprouting, Robins In Many Sections and "Fever" Felt

CHICAGO, Jan. 28. (UP)—Spring-like weather, with robins, tulips and peach tree blossoms in full array, prevailed over most of the United States tonight.

Instead of fighting blizzards, snow and ice, citizens generally were strolling around without their overcoats, watching ducks fly northward, examining crocus buds, listening to birds sing and fighting off well-developed, even if premature cases of "spring fever."

BREAKS RECORDS

Weather bureau throughout the nation reported warm weather records of years' standing for January had been broken, while the lack of snow in many places was unprecedented since the last century.

Temperatures reached the 70's in the Pacific coast, the highest seasonal levels in 28 years. Dandelions, crocuses, wild currants and primroses bloomed throughout Oregon and Washington, while butterflies flitted from flower to flower, summer birds trilled and trees began to bud.

"SPRING FEVER" Sunny skies and warm temperatures prevailed in the Rocky mountain states. Among the large assortment of robins reported at Albuquerque, N. M., was one with one leg. Trees budded in Pueblo, Colo., where heavy snows at this time of year are the usual weather diet.

Strawberries were ripening at Duray, Colo., in an everbearing patch located over warm steam pipes, while tulips were ready to burst in Denver, where "spring fever" had office workers on the defensive. In Utah the weather remained cold.
