TODAY'S MARKETS

PORTLAND

PORTLAND, Jan. 28. (UP)—Hogs estimated 600, including around 100 drive-ins. Market opened slow and weak, closed active, but 25 cents lower than on Tuesday for slaughter classes.

Rail supply, three double decks, all sold on basis of 49 for best light butchers except one small lot outstanding quality sorted out to a small killer at \$9.25. Over and under weights \$8.50 and fairly smooth packing saws at \$7. Drive-ins sold the same way but some 49 sales got strongweights up to 220 pounds and better, with both over and underweights in instances down to \$5. Feeders absent, in strong demand up to \$10, steady.

Cattle estimated 65, calves 10. Over half drive-ins. Market quotably steady. Rail supply 29 mixed steers and she stock. Steers graded medium to fairly good with 1130 pound kinds \$7.50 and 977 pound \$8.50. Cows and heifers, low medium to good, averaged from around 1000 to over 1300 pounds at \$5.67.5. Drive-ins mostly low cutters to common she stock \$1.50-2.50.

Sheep estimated 100, all drive-ins. Market quotably steady. Medium to fairly good 80 pound lambs \$6.75 and 91 pound \$6.50; medium to choice yearlings quotable \$4.50-5.50 and cull to choice ewes \$1.50-3.50.

Sheep: Medium to choice lambs \$6.50-8.

KANSAS CITY

KANSAS CITY, Jan. 28. (UP)—Sheep alone advanced on the Kansas City livestock market today while hogs were unchanged to lower and cattle sold steady to weak.

Cattle receipts were above the seasonal average. Steers sold from \$7.00-9.50 and yearlings from \$7.50-9.50. Heavy hog receipts caused a 15 to 20c decline in that department. Top fat hogs sold for \$7.65 and the bulk of sales ranged from \$7.45-7.65.

Sheep were 25 cents higher as active trading took up all receipts, which were light. Fed lambs brought from \$8.00-9.00 and feed-lambs from \$6.00-8.
