

Mrs. Bruce To Join Princes In Buenos Aires

WASHINGTON, Jan. 30 (UP)—An opportunity to fly across the South Atlantic and join the Prince of Wales as a representative of British industries at the Buenos Aires imperial exposition, caused Mrs. Victor Bruce, British aviator, to drop arrangements today to visit President Hoover and other Washington officials.

Mrs. Bruce arrived here after the airplane in which she has nearly completed a round-the-world flight, was damaged at Baltimore, Md.

An urgent message from British industries caused Mrs. Bruce to change her mind and she will sail from New York for London early next week.

In England she plans to get a more powerful plane and to fly with her husband across Africa and the South Atlantic to Buenos Aires. The greatest haste is necessary, she explained, to complete the trip by the time the Prince of Wales arrives there.

From Buenos Aires, she hopes to fly up the west coast of South America back to Washington.

Convict Escapes in Portland, Is Officers' Belief

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 30 (UP)—It was believed today that Dan Flynn and Lee Duncan, who escaped from the Oregon state penitentiary at Salem last night, were somewhere in the vicinity of Portland.

E. S. Worden and Ben Edwards, employees at the penitentiary, came here today to assist police in the search for the two missing convicts.

The state announced the offer of a \$50 reward for the capture of either of the two prisoners.

Officials said the men might come here because of the fact that Flynn has many friends in Portland.

In making their escape last night, Flynn and Duncan took advantage of a heavy fog which lay over the capital city and the fact that no guard is kept in tower No. 3 at night.

United Press Staff Correspondent CHICAGO, Jan. 30. (UP)—America's warmest January in half a century may be blamed in part on the mysterious spots on the sun, Prof. Griffith Taylor, one of the nation's most renowned climatologists, said tonight.

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More Scenes of Early Klamath Falls Added To Chamber's Exhibit

"And once again the scene was changed—" and in the window of the Klamath chamber of commerce are displayed scenes of Klamath Falls as she was in the days of yore. The latest collection of photographs on exhibit belongs to A. L. Leavitt, an authority on ancient history of Klamath Falls, near Linkville.

Perhaps the most unique picture in the collection is a group of prominent men of the city. All are arrayed in the height of fashion and brave in hirsute adornment. G. W. Smith, the second county judge of Klamath county, A. L. Leavitt, second county clerk and later circuit judge, and C. L. Parrish, second city recorder are among the notables in the photograph.

COAST ON STREET

Crowds Fight To Get Glimpse Of Celebrities

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 30. (UP)—Several persons were knocked down or fainted as a crowd estimated at 30,000 persons craned for a glimpse of movie celebrities at the premiere of Charlie Chaplin's "City Lights" tonight.

An original detail of 150 police officers was unable to control the 3,000 persons jammed in front of the theatre. An additional 100 officers, comprising the "Red" squad, expert in handling crowds, was rushed to the Los Angeles Theatre and succeeded in stretching new ropes to control the throng.

The crowd had surged forward when Chaplin's car, bringing the comedian, Georgia Hale and Prof. and Mrs. Albert Einstein, arrived. Glass covers on lobby displays were shattered and women knocked to the ground. A police ambulance was called and doctors gave first aid.

A number of film stars, including Marion Nixon, Conrad Nagel and Gloria Swanson, were arriving at the moment, and were disheveled as they tried to push their way into the theatre.

Allen Hall Wins Over J. Layton

CHICAGO, Jan. 30. (UP)—Allen Hall, young Chicago cuedist, won second place in the world's three-cushion billiard tournament tonight, by defeating his former teacher and last year's champion, Johnny Layton, of St. Louis, 50 to 29, in 22 innings.

Hall started with a run of seven points in the opening inning, and never was in danger. He was defeated last night by Art Thurnblad, also of Chicago, who thereby won the \$20,000 title.

British Princes Nearing Havana, Will Not Visit

HAVANA, Jan. 30. (UP)—The Prince of Wales and his youngest brother, Prince George, on a tour of South American countries, will not get off the Oropesa when the liner touches here Sunday, it was learned today.

The Oropesa is not due until 7 a. m. Sunday, a day late, and is scheduled to sail three hours later.
