SALEM, Ore., Jan. 30, (UP)—State corporation department has issued a permit to the Bennett Air transport by which that company is authorized to sell stocks and bonds in this state.

D. M. Rhorer, representing the Bennett organization, said his concern had but three months longer to operate between valley points and the city of Portland, before completing all requirements of preliminary nature, when formal application may be filed with the postal department at Washington for a mail contract.

The company plans according to Rhorer, to carry mail from Portland to Marshfield, from Marshfield to Roseburg and Medford, and from Medford to Burns and Bend, and from these points to possibly Baker and tance back to Portland.
