## AMERICAN'S BEER TRIED, IS WANTING

NEW YORK, Feb. 5, (UP)—American beer has been tried and found wanting. After two days experimentation with the liquids sold in New York as beer, ranging from the tasty but kickless soda fountain beverage called "near," to the more potent speakeasy drink termed "real," Seraphim Martin, French track star, has rearranged a training schedule which always has included beer with his meals.

Martin, who holds the world record for 800-meters, arrived in New York Tuesday for a 21-day tour of American tracks and immediately started training for his debut in the Millrose games at Madison Square Garden. Martin explained that he has been wont to sip beer not as a refreshment but as a medicine. He is inclined to be this and found that beer served in France not only provided him with a tasty refreshment but helped put flesh over the muscles which give him his speed. The experiments with the New York brand, however, were enough to cause him to seek a new training beverage.

Despite his forced change in training diet, the French star has made a favorable impression on American track followers and he is favored to win the half-mile race in the Millrose games Saturday.
