Scholar From India To Talk Here for Week

"The Swami"—Indra Raimohan Dutta—A. B. of India, is in Klamath Falls to deliver a series of lectures at the Willard hotel ball room from February 6 to 16, inclusive. Swami Dutta is an educator and research scholar of the scientific and industrial association of India.

In order to investigate the educational situation in this country he is touring the United States by automobile, visiting every state in the union.

"Education, as a whole," says Swami, "is so objective to requirements that it almost defeats its own purpose. It should deal rather with the development of the soul."

Swami Indra Dutta received his A. B. degree from the National College of Calcutta in 1905, and in 1920 he took post graduate work at the University of California.

Literature was his major subject throughout the years of his academic training, and he is extremely well read in modern as well as in classical literature. His favorite American author is Emerson, because the latter adheres practically the same philosophy and conceptions as prevail in India.

His lectures will be given in the following order, one each day: "Make Your Destiny," "Be Self-Confident and Self-Reliant," "Stop Worrying," "Swift Way to Health Through Mystic Diet Plus," "Get Luxurious Liteness and Radiant Happiness," "Overcoming Nervousness," "Stay Young With All the 'Staying Power,'" "Be Financially Independent," "The Freedom of the Soul," "Vibratory Healing," and "Tap the Source of All Power for All-Around Success."

Rev. Petter Will Visit in Klamath

MODERN MILK PLANT MARVEL OF MACHINERY

Something Doing Every Few Seconds in Scientific Milk Manufacture

If Hippocrates, who lived during the fifth century B. C., and was given the distinction of being the father of medicine, could only look down through the ages and speak it would be to say, "Marvelous." This ancient doctor saw and recommended the need of milk in the human diet. Modern civilization and science have revolutionized the dairying industry.

Instead of the crude methods of ages ago he would see here a modern milk processing plant in the Pacific Northwest. He would also see an endless flow of milk—thousands of gallons going into the large weighing tank—milk from the finest, inspected herds that graze upon the pastures of Klamath county.

ALL IN DAY

From early hours of the morning the whirr of machinery in motion, the blast of the hot fire in the boilers, and the rattling of bottles and cans never cease until late evening. Steaming cans and bottle washers carrying their large loads of cans and bottles over whirling brushes and through spraying hot streams of water, spotless pasteurizers filled with milk and cream, and sterilizers discharging the bottles ready to be filled from the automatic bottling machine, then placed on our fleet of milk trucks, ready to be delivered to the homes and stores is only part of the many happenings at the Lost River Dairy plant.

"It all happens in a day's work," remarked Mr. Bowman, the plant superintendent.

"We have just finished relaying new sanitary floors of steel and concrete in our cool rooms. The steel reinforcement prevents the cracking or chipping of the concrete, thereby making a perfect surface, easily steamed and cleaned."

"Too much care cannot be given in safeguarding against bacteria development. Every piece of equipment coming in contact with milk or cream is sterilized every day. This is particularly true of the many thousands of bottles checked in daily. Every bottle must be thoroughly cleaned before going to the sterilizer."

CHOCOLATE MILK

This year we will bottle approximately 100,000 bottles of milk for the school children only. The greater portion of this amount being special chocolate milk.

"Every 42 seconds between the hours of 6 and 2 p. m., represents a delivery of a bottle of milk some place in the city."

Mr. Bowman's responsibilities or duties do not end with the milk department. In the egg department every case must be checked as to quality and grade before going out to the customers.

The butter department also requires no little attention. Then comes cottage cheese, which Mr. Bowman explains as being run by degrees and seconds. Heating to a certain temperature, holding it there just to the required number of minutes, then changing again.

"It is just one thing after another and we are ready to start all over again for the next day," remarked Mr. Bowman as he was called to the telephone.

Nichols Waives Charges; Stout Awaits Hearing

Formal charges of larceny by embezzlement of funds and assets were filed against James Garland Nichols and Daniel Basil Scott, confessed robbers of the Chiloquin State bank on January 30, in justice court Thursday.

Nichols, former cashier of the bank, waived preliminary hearing, which says that his case will go to the grand jury.

Oregon law imposes a prison sentence from one to twenty years or a fine of \$5,000, or both, for the crime of larceny by embezzlement of funds and assets.

"Penny" Stout, Nichols' confessed accomplice in the robbing of the bank, did not waive preliminary hearing, but his counsel, Ralph W. Horan, asked for 24 hours to study the charge, and to decide on the course of action to be taken by his client.

Nichols is being represented by Henry E. Perkins.

No charges have as yet been filed against Carl Eastlick and Louis Duvall, implicated in the crime by the confession of Nichols.

Both Nichols and Stout seemed nervous and harassed in court yesterday. Nichols was meticulously dressed, while Stout wore his shirt open at the throat, his sleeves rolled above his elbows, and no coat or vest.

Nichols' brother from Fullerton, Calif., arrived yesterday and spent some time closeted with his counsel. Nichols young wife and child are also in the city, but they did not appear at the arraignment in justice court.
