

DAIRYMEN TO RECEIVE PRIZES

Dana Will Be Speaker At Annual Dinner On February 20

Prizes for the Klamath County Cow Testing association will be awarded at the Fourth Annual Dairy dinner at the Willard hotel February 20, which is sponsored by the Kiwanis club and the chamber of commerce.

The chamber of commerce will present a prize to the dairyman whose herd has produced the most butterfat during the past year. An award will be given by Bruce Dennis, publisher of the Klamath News and Evening Herald to the dairyman who has the highest butterfat producing cow. The third prize will be given by the Kiwanis club to the dairyman whose lowest producing cow produces more butterfat than the low producing cow in any other herd. These awards are to be some useful article rather than the traditional silver cup.

MORSE TO ATTEND
Roger W. Morse, dairy specialist in the extension department of the Oregon State college, will be here to attend the dinner and present certificates of merit to all qualifying herd owners in the cow testing association.

Tickets for dinner are being sold by members of the Kiwanis committee, grange members and the agricultural committee of the chamber of commerce. The grange selling tickets to the highest percentage of its membership will also be given a prize.

DANA WILL SPEAK
P. M. Brandt, professor of dairy husbandry at the Oregon State college, will be toastmaster for this event, and Marshall Dana, associate editor of the Oregon Journal, will be the main speaker.

This dinner is sponsored each year for the purpose of promoting the dairy industry in Klamath county.

STATE TO LET HIGHWAY JOBS

Improvement of 154 Miles Of Roads and Bridges To Be Undertaken

SALEM, Feb. 6. (UP) — In line with its policy of providing increased highway construction and improvement during 1931, the state highway commission will call for bids February 19, for improvement of more than 154 miles of state roads and bridges.

Following is a list of projects contemplated:
Baker and Matheuer—Construction 13.53 miles bituminous macadam on Old Oregon Trail; 6.33 miles surface treatment John Day highway; grading 6.05 miles Peach-Sperry section, Central Oregon highway.

WORK IN VALLEY
Curry—Furnishing 15,000 cubic yards gravel for Myers creek Taylor creek section, Roosevelt coast highway.

Douglas and Lane—Construction 1.60 miles roadbed, tunneling 1600 feet on Elk creek tunnel section, Umpqua highway; construction 54.02 miles non-skid bituminous pavement on Eugene-Willamette section, Pacific highway; construction reinforced concrete bridge over Weatherly creek, Umpqua highway; construction reinforced concrete bridge over Elk creek, Umpqua highway.

MANY JOBS
Josephine—Grading 2.4 miles Green creek-Jackson county line section, Pacific highway.
Lincoln — Furnishing 13,000 yards broken stone for Otter Rock-Newport-Tahlequah section, Roosevelt and Corvallis-Newport highways.

Umatilla—Resurfacing, resurfacing 7.8 miles Nye-Pilot Rock section, Oregon-Washington highway.
Linn—Construction reinforced concrete structural steel bridge over Santiam river on Santiam highway.

Union—Construction 4.6 miles resurfacing on La Grande-Union section, Old Oregon Trail.
Washington—Construction reinforced concrete bridge over Rock creek, West Side Pacific highway.

Despite the unsatisfactory price of wheat prevailing on the Canadian prairies, conditions on the Canadian live, as a whole, are good, Mr. Druce stated. While tonnage handled is less than the amount of business carried last year, it is expected that foreign markets will open in the near future and the surplus of commodities now existing will be readily disposed of, with the result that business at the end of 1931 will be as good, if not better, than 1930, the traveling freight agent pointed out.

Conflict in Dates Seen in Ski Carnivals

FORT KLAMATH, Feb. 6. — (Special) — Klamath's fifth annual winter sports tournament at Fort Klamath and the Olympic elimination contests to be held at Lake Tahoe this year, are both scheduled for February 22.

This conflict of dates puts several noted skiers, especially Manfred Jacobson, three-time winner of the Crater Lake race, in a pickle. The winner of the elimination contest would be in line for the Olympic ski contest at Lake Placid in 1932, and Jacobson is picked as the favorite to win the event at Lake Tahoe. At the same time he has a chance this year to win "the Klamath," a giant trophy of the Crater Lake Ski club.

Reports from McCloud, Calif., say that Jacobson is training and praying that some arrangement of dates might be made that would enable him to participate in both events.

Word has been received from Bend that all jumpers of the Sky-liners club not attending a tournament at Cle Elum, Wash., next Sunday, will probably come to Fort Klamath to practice on the jump.

Susanville To Alturas Road To Be Sponsored

ALTURAS, (Modoc Co.), Feb. 6.—The Modoc County Development board has gone on record as sponsoring a road from Alturas to Susanville by way of Big Valley. This means the abandonment of the old route by way of Likely and across the Madeline Plains.

The annual banquet held last Saturday night brought a delegation from Susanville headed by A. J. Matthews which urged the cooperation of Modoc county in the project on account of its being the best route between the county seats of Modoc and Lassen counties. Matthews stated that Lassen county had already appropriated \$15,000 towards the road and that \$75,000 more had been promised by the state of California.

The road would leave the Redding-Alturas highway between Adin and Bieber and follow practically the present route from Big Valley to Susanville, running through Grasshopper Valley and along Eagle Lake. It is argued that this route is preferable to the one by way of Madeline for the reason that it would also afford an outlet for the heavily populated farming region of Big Valley and vicinity.
