

MILLROSE GAMES GET HUGE CROWD

Records Fall in Some of Events; Ray Conger Is Big Star

NEW YORK, Feb. 7 (AP)—The twenty-fourth annual running of the Millrose games, one of America's most historic indoor track and field meets, attracted international field of athletes and a crowd of 15,000 spectators tonight. Canada, France, Switzerland, Sweden and the United States were represented.

The Millrose A. A. won the first relay of the evening, beating the Meadowbrook club of Philadelphia in a match event at one mile. Bob Bleman of Notre Dame, ran in second position for Millrose. The time was 3:40.4.

COLLEGE RELAYS
The University of New Hampshire won the first of a series of one mile college relays. St. Johns of Brooklyn and Fordham university were the other starters.

The time was 3:23.8. The second one mile college relay was won by Amherst college in 3:29.4. William and Mary was second. Union college third and Williams college fourth.

Bates college beat the University of Pennsylvania in a college match, two mile relay. The time was 7:56. This beat the best former Millrose time by 2.6 seconds.

WINS FEATURE EVENT
George Bulwinkle of the College of the City of New York, won the 1,000 yard run, first feature event of the program. His time was 2:16. Sam Martin of the Boston A. A. was second, and Frank Nardoli, unattached, was third. Dr. Paul Martin of Switzerland, most importantly advertised starter, was a poor fourth. This was Dr. Martin's third contest of the indoor season and he has yet to score a victory.

Princeton won the third one mile college relay beating North Carolina which finished second by nearly 50 yards. The time was 3 minutes 25-1/5 seconds.

Princeton's team was made up of C. B. McInnes, C. Wesker, S. Carlett and B. H. Hand. R. W. Drane, J. K. Smith, Lionel S. Weil and Charles Farmer ran for North Carolina.

Heels were leading in the second quarter mile, but the margin enjoyed by Smith was lost by Weil and Farmer, who strove manfully but could not close the gap.

Lafayette college was third and Rutgers university fourth. **WILSON WINS "600"**

Alex Wilson of Notre Dame won the Millrose "600," second feature event of the program. His time was one minute 13-2/5 seconds.

Wilson took the lead two laps from the finish, and held it until the end to win by six yards over Eddie Roll of Newark, N. J. A. C. last year's winner.

Roll held the lead until Wilson took it. Roll would have won permanent possession of the John Wanamaker, Jr. trophy had he finished first tonight.

Phil Edwards of the Hamilton (Canada) Olympic club was third, and Clyde Blanchard of Millrose A. A. fourth.

CONGER GETS CUP
Percy Beard of Alabama, won the 50-yard high hurdles event in 4-5/10 seconds. Leo Sentman of the University of Illinois, was second, and J. J. O'Brien of Notre Dame university was third. John Janis of Fordham university, scheduled featured starter in this event, did not compete.

Ray Conger, standard bearer of the Illinois A. C., won permanent possession of the Rodman Wanamaker trophy by winning the one-mile run in four minutes 13-2/5 seconds.

Leo Sentman of the Boston A. A. was second, Gene Venzke of the Swedish American A. V., third, and Joe Sivak of Butler university, fourth. Four ran. Hinkle was off to an early lead, with Conger second.

Conger scored one more field goal than Washington, but the Huskies made eight free throws to Oregon's four.

WORLD'S RECORD
A world record was established in the girls' relay at 440 yards which was won by the Millrose A. A. team of New York. The time was 50-1/5 seconds, the old record of 51-5/10 seconds was made in 1920 by the Millrose team. M. Gilliland, J. Cross, G. Janzen and L. McNeil ran for Millrose. The Medford-Boston team was second, and Meadowbrook-Philadelphia, third.

Canada defeated the United States in an international four-man relay at distances of 220 and 440 yards. The time was two minutes, 23 seconds. M. W. Christie, Ed Percy, Tom Richie and P. W. Pickard ran for Canada.

After the advent of Fascism Italy began a new life of disciplined work and concord. . . . The miraculous work accomplished by Fascism has made Italy respected by the other nations. . . ."

The third grade book for children instructs them to strive for a healthy body and spirit and so be ready "if the nation calls to arms and fall serenely if the country's welfare demands the supreme sacrifice."

NEW DEVELOPMENT
In the last few weeks another development opened the way to inculcation with Fascist conceptions of the young men who do not join the Balilla organizations. This is the decision that all youths from the age of 18 until the conscription age of 21 must undergo pre-military training on Sundays. The training is done by Fascist militia officers.

A remarkable national movement originated by Fascist called "Dopolavoro" (literally "after work") keeps older working men in contact with Fascist organization. The basis is cultural and recreational, but the spirit of Fascism is communicated to members. Membership has reached 1,670,000. Dopolavoro organizes sports, theatricals, bands, excursions and lectures. Last year nearly 4,000,000 participated.

According to the figures of the Fascist membership is over 1,650,000. Membership of the great Fascist syndicates of employers and employees which regulates relations between employer and worker is given as 4,255,000.

The Fascist "Black Shirt" Militia is better organized and equipped than ever and numbers 395,000—nearly twice the regular army. It was announced they have pledged themselves to 10 years more service. Thus the regime is extremely well armed.

GAINED SUPPORT
Through efficient government, preservation of public order, improvement of public services, vast extension of public works, regulation of relations between capital and labor, improvement of economic conditions, the Fascist regime has gained great support.

An indication of Mussolini's confidence was the courageous action by a stroke of the pen in reducing the salaries of 700,000 public servants by 12 per cent in December, which instantly affected about 3,000,000 persons.

That Mussolini was able to do this successfully was a conclusive evidence of the regime's strength.

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 7. (UP)—Washington strengthened its hold on northern division Pacific coast conference basketball honors tonight by defeating Oregon State, 28 to 26 in the closest fought game played here this season. Washington led at the half, 14 to 11.

Beletti, Etienne Bussac, a former minister of Freemasonry, who was charged with attempting to organize anti-Fascist group called "Young Italy," and 24 others in December, was a result of activities of the mysterious "O. V. R. A." also the arrests of Rendi, Vinciguerra, the American-born woman Liliana DeBosis, and their companions.

They had sent circulars attacking the government through the mails, asserting among other things, that the budgets resulted in deficits instead of surpluses and giving figures.

The recent more definite under-current of dissatisfaction is due to a combination of factors. Inasmuch as the government controls nearly every phase of national activity, it is blamed for everything that displeases.

Taxation is very high. Mussolini estimated it at eight and one-half times higher than pre-war, and stated it cannot be made heavier. Unemployment is increasing. It is officially estimated that it may still rise more than 100,000 during the winter.

The world economic crisis is striking Italy, and Fascism gets much of the blame. Furthermore, there is the normal movement of public opinion against any government that endures eight years.

At present the Fascist party is undergoing a drastic "clean out" and general tightening up of qualifications of membership. Those whose conduct has been unsatisfactory, or who are believed not to be dyed-in-the-wool Fascists, are being ejected. Giovanni Guiratti, secretary of the Fascist party, told me it was a "revision" of the membership and henceforth every member "must be 100 per cent Fascist." He emphasized this was proof that the party does not attach great importance to large numbers but principally to unwavering loyalty.
