Bootleggers on Gain Or State Officers Busier

SALEM, Feb. 7. (UP)—Oregon either has more bootleggers or better enforcement of state prohibition laws.

A 1929 tabulation of prosecutions, seizures and fines made by state agents shows more liquor law violations than in 1929, according to records on file with George Alexander, state prohibition commissioner.

MANY ARRESTS
State officers made 1345 arrests for violation during 1929 as compared to 1294 for 1929, Alexander said. The average number of agents in his employ was nine.

The agents seized 191 stills, compared to 138 for the previous year and 59 cars were confiscated as compared to 59 in 1929.

LINES ASSESSED

A total of \$169,575 in fines was assessed as compared to \$173,929.60 for the previous year while 38,212 days in jail sentences were doled out as compared to 34,719 days spent in jail by 1929's bootleggers.

The officials destroyed 14,551 gallons of liquor and 45,928 gallons of mash as compared to 15,791 gallons of liquor and 85,794 gallons of mash destroyed in the previous year.
