

Educators Greet High School Kids At College City

OREGON STATE COLLEGE, CORVALLIS, Ore., Feb. 12 (UP)—Leading Oregon educators gathered here today to welcome prospective college students for a three-day convention intended to impart some of the purpose of higher education.

VANDERBILT ANGERED AT GEN. BUTLER

May File Civil Suit On Mussolini Incident Unless Retracted

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Feb. 12 (UP)—The San Diego Sun said in a copyrighted interview with Cornelius Vanderbilt, Jr., today that the young writer may file a civil suit against Gen. Smedley D. Butler as the result of the Butler-Mussolini incident.

Vanderbilt said he would bring suit unless "certain things are retracted" and "others cleared up," the Sun story said. Vanderbilt has been here in San Diego for several days.

Gen. Butler's speech before a Philadelphia club in which he said he had learned that Premier Benito Mussolini, of Italy, had run down a child in his automobile and had not halted, caused the United States to apologize to Italy. Courtmartial proceedings were instituted, but dropped with a reprimand to the general.

"The Butler courtmartial may be at an end in Washington," Vanderbilt was quoted as saying. "But as far as I am concerned there are still a lot of other things to be cleared up, including the statement attributed to me by Butler over the so-called Mussolini hit and run episode."

Pressed for details as to the cause for a possible civil suit against Butler, Vanderbilt made his first public statement of the incident referred to by Butler in Philadelphia and which brought about the apology by the United States.

At the original gathering of some 25 of the members of the American Affiliated Lecture Bureau in November, 1926, it was understood and agreed that things said by General Butler, another speaker and myself were not to be repeated outside the four walls of the lecture room," the Sun quoted Vanderbilt.

"General Butler not only violated the confidence of this lecturing group but repeated inaccurately a statement of mine before the contemporary club of Philadelphia in January," Vanderbilt declared.

"General Butler credited me with saying that Mussolini killed a child while motoring and that he (Mussolini) drove on with the remark, 'what is one life in the affairs of state.'"

"I am not trying to dig up the past, but there have been so many garbled accounts concerning this matter that I now feel that in justice to my own work, which has suffered considerably since the incident, the public should know the real truth in that Gen. Butler violated the agreement of our lecturing organization."

"The incident which General Butler incorrectly described came about in the following manner:

"I was riding with Mussolini, who was driving his car. At a sharp jog in the road a small child ran in front of the machine and was hit. I looked back to see if the child had been hurt and as I did Mussolini placed his hand on my knee and these were his very words: 'Never look back, Mr. Vanderbilt, always look ahead in life.'"

"I wonder how General Butler could feel if I were not to respect his confidence and repeat some of the very confidential things he has said in my hearing. My position all during this controversy has been that a gentleman should not violate confidential information but now that the courtmartial has been dismissed I feel the public should know the true state of affairs."

ARREST OF PAIR ENDS LONG CHASE

Tennessee Men Found In Northwest Cities By Southern Sheriff

PENDLETON, Feb. 12 (UP)—Two alleged murderers were arrested in the Pacific northwest today—John Eddington, wanted for the murder of W. R. Kingston, near Chattanooga, Tenn., December 12, was arrested at Helix, Ore., and Hugh Bowen, Eddington's alleged partner, was taken into custody at Centralia, Wash.

The captures today culminated one of the longest criminal chases in the history of Tennessee. Sheriff Taylor of Chattanooga, was the officer who trailed the two men across the continent and finally ran them to ground.

Eddington was placed under arrest at Helix, a few miles north of here, by officers who had watched him for days upon orders from Sheriff Taylor. Bowen was arrested later when letters found on Eddington disclosed his whereabouts.

It is charged that Eddington and Bowen blew Kingston's head off with a shotgun, and dressed the body in Bowen's clothes, in an attempt to obtain \$10,000 life insurance carried by Bowen.

Sheriff Taylor left here tonight for Centralia to get Bowen and bring him back to Pendleton. Sheriff Taylor will then take both men back to Chattanooga to face charges of murdering Kingston.

Bowen is married and his wife lives in Chattanooga. Eddington was living with his wife at Helix when arrested.

Harvey, Dundee End Training for Battle Tonight

NEW YORK, Feb. 12 (UP)—Len Harvey, champion of the English middleweight championship, and Vince Dundee of Baltimore, a leading American contender for the world's title, rested easily tonight after a training siege for their 12-round bout Friday. The fight appears to be a toss-up, and the evenness is reflected in the betting.

Dundee and Harvey met once before and Dundee won the decision. While there were a few malcontents to boot the decision most boxing writers regarded it as just. Indeed, it is Harvey at least as often as Harvey hit Dundee, and Vince's blows had less more glimp.

Harvey's intimates say that he has trained more seriously for his second Dundee start than he has ever trained before.
