things of my youth; hear these words all ye nations; give ear all ye inhabitants of the world, both rich and poor together; give ear ye islands, and listen ye peoples from afar to Almighty God.

PEACE ON EARTH

"Let our first words be 'Glory to God in the highest and on earth peace to men of good will. Glory to God who in our days hath given such power to men that their words should reach in every truth to the ends of the earth, and peace on earth where we are ambassadors of that divine redeemer, Jesus, who, coming, preached peace. Peace to them that were afar off and peace to them that were high—bringing peace in the blood of his cross, both as to the things on earth and things that are in Heaven."

To Catholics: "Turning now to men, we bear in mind the words of the apostles—'Work ye to all men and especially to those who are of the household of the faith.' We are pleased, therefore, to speak, in the first place, to those who have been received in the master's family and the master's fold of the Catholic church, and call us by the loving name of Father. To all, that is, fathers and sons, sheep and lambs whom Christ the universal pastor and king has entrusted to us to nourish and to guide."

TO THE LEADERS

"To the leaders of peoples: 'Since we are debtors to all, in the first place, we pray the leaders to govern in justice and in charity, unto edification and not destruction, and mindful that there is not a power from God, and that they must render unto God a strict account. To the rich also and to the poor we speak. We remind the rich to consider themselves as ministers of God's providence, trustees and stewards of his gifts. To them Christ owes himself has confided the poor. From them the divine judge will demand more, because they have received more. Let them never forget the words of Christ: 'A great trust is laid upon you.'"

TO ALL CLASSES

"To the poor: 'We earnestly exhort the poor to think of the poverty of Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior. We ask them to be mindful of his example and promises. We ask them not to neglect what is easier for them, the acquisition of spiritual wealth, and whilst they are endeavoring to better their condition as mortals they may, let them with a good and upright heart commend themselves to God and not stretch forth their hands to iniquity. To laborers and employers: 'We earnestly entreat laborers and employers to put aside hostile rivalry and strife and unite in friendly and brotherly accord, the employer supplying means and direction; the laborer, industry and toil. Let both seek what is just and both give what is just. Let both as well at the same time work out the good of each and the good of all in the tranquillity of order.'"

POPE MAKES NEW HISTORY

ray outside the station the famous Swiss guards, rifles in place of their traditional long pikes, stood at attention. Their brilliant red, yellow and blue uniforms blended into a magnificent scene of papal glory.

POPE PULLS SWITCH

The Pope was first escorted to the machine room of Station HVJ, where Senator Marconi and the Pope briefly inspected the apparatus. The Pope then turned a switch which closed the circuits in the power house, officially starting the machinery.

MARCONI'S WORDS

"It is my very great honor and privilege to announce to you that within a very moment the supreme pontiff, his Holiness Pius XI, will inaugurate the radio station of the state of Vatican City."

"The electric waves will carry his august words of peace and benediction throughout the world. For nearly 20 centuries the Roman pontiffs have given their inspired messages to all peoples, but this is the first time in history that the living voice of the Pope will have been heard simultaneously in all parts of the globe."

"With the help of Almighty God, who places such mysterious forces of nature at mankind's disposal, I have been able to prepare this instrument that will permit the faithful the consolation of hearing the voice of the Holy Father."

"Holy Father, I have today the happiness of consigning to you, its completion is now consecrated by your august presence. I pray, Holy Father, I pray you, to let your voice be heard all over the world."

Without further ceremony Pope Pius stepped before the microphone and began broadcasting the first papal radio message in history. It marked a new era in the freedom of the "prisoner of the Vatican" who two years ago signed an accord with the Italian government under which his sovereignty was recognized.

The Pope left the station a few minutes later, and proceeded directly to the papal academy of sciences. An extraordinary session was held in celebration of the coronation anniversary, the inauguration of the new station and to install Senator Marconi as a member.

COURAGE PLEA OF PRESIDENT

Lincoln's life was engrossed with tremendous problems, yet he was a man of many interests. He was a believer in party government. He realized, as we also must realize, that fundamentally our whole self-government is conceived and born of majority rule, and to enable the majority to express itself we must have party organization. Lincoln led in founding the Republican party and he gloried in his party. His tradition has dominated it to this day.

ISSUES CHANGE

While many of the issues of that time are dead and gone, some of our present problems were equally vivid in his day. In Lincoln's day the dominant problem in our form of government turned upon the issue of states rights. Though less pregnant with disaster, the dominant problem today in our form of government turns in large degree upon the issue of the relationship of federal, state, and local government responsibilities. We are faced with increasing agitation that the federal government shall assume new financial burdens, that it shall undertake increased burdens in regulation of abuses and in the prosecution of crime.

It is true that since Lincoln's time many forces have swept across state borders and have become more potent than the state or local community can deal with alone either financially or by jurisdiction. Our concept of federal, state, and local responsibilities is possible of no unchangeable definitions and it must shift with the moving forces in the nation, but the time has come when we must have more national consideration and decision of the part which each shall assume in these responsibilities.

NEW RESPONSIBILITIES

The federal government has assumed many new responsibilities since Lincoln's time, and will probably assume more in the future when the states and local communities cannot alone cure abuse or bear the entire cost of national programs, but there is an essential principle that should be maintained in these matters. I am convinced that where federal action is essential then in most cases it should limit its responsibilities to supplement the states and local communities, and that it should not assume the major role or the entire responsibility, in replacement of the states or local government. To do otherwise threatens the whole foundations of local government, which is the very basis of self-government.

avenue by which we may both resist this drift to centralized government and at the same time meet a multitude of problems. That is to strengthen in the nation a sense and an organization of self-help and cooperation to solve as many problems as possible outside of government. We are today passing through a critical test in such a problem arising from the economic depression.

MARCH RETARDED

Due to lack of caution in business and to the impact of forces from an outside world, one-half of which is involved in social and political revolution, the march of our prosperity has been retarded. We are projected into temporary unemployment, losses, and hardships. In a nation rich in resources, many people were faced with hunger and cold through no fault of their own. Our national resources are not only material supplies and material wealth but a spiritual and moral wealth in kindness, in compassion, in a sense of obligation of neighbor to neighbor and a realization of responsibility by industry, by business, and the community for its social security and its social welfare.

NEED NEW COURAGE

The ever-growing complexity of modern life, with its train of evermore perplexing and difficult problems, is a challenge to our individual characters and to our devotion to our ideals. The resourcefulness of America when challenged has never failed. Success is now gained by leaning upon government to solve all the problems before us. That way leads to enervation of will and destruction of character. Victory over this depression and over our other difficulties will be won by the resolution of our people to fight their own battles in their own communities, by stimulating their ingenuity to solve their own problems, by taking new courage to be masters of their own destiny in the struggle of life. This is not the easy way, but it is the American way. And it was Lincoln's way.
