

LAWSON'S WIN BY ONE POINT IN HOT GAME

Weyerhaeuser Five Nosed Out; Manhattan Club Beats Keno

In one of the most spectacular finishes ever seen in Klamath Falls, Lawson's Bengals won from the Weyerhaeuser five by one lone point. The game was 39 to 38 when Stinton, Bengal guard, sank one from the side of the gym for the winning points. Ten seconds after the ball found the hoop the timekeeper, D. W. Holloway, blew the whistle ending the game.

CROWD EXCITED

During the game the players gave all they had and had the largest crowd to date on their toes half the time. In the first half the Bengals took their three time-out periods. The pace was telling on them. After they came to life and played the rest of the game in fair shape.

The Bengals were crippled and only had five men and a poor sub to start the game with. Oliver, forward, was in Portland and McCulloch was on the sideline with a broken jaw and could not play.

Another basket by Howard Wakeman put the mill back in the lead with one and just before the whistle Stinton sank his shot to win the game.

Lawson's passing attack did not click and several times the lost ball when they should have worked it into the goal. Every man on both teams deserves a lot of credit for the game he played and sportsmanship displayed. Odell was high point man with 17 and Pee-Wee Estes led the Cats with 12.

Duffy Sets New Speed Skating Amateur Mark

LAKE PLACID, N. Y., Feb. 12 (UP)—Ross Robinson of Toronto retained his lead in the third day's racing of North American amateur speed skating championships races at Olympic stadium today, bringing his point score to 169.

Ray Murray of New York held second place by bringing his point score to 50, while Allan Potts of Brooklyn sprung a surprise by jumping to third place with a total point score of 49.

Orel Duffy of Toronto turned in the feature performance of the day, setting a new world record of 28:17.5 seconds to win the one-mile race for boys under 14. It was Duffy's fourth world record in three days.

GET CLUE TO FIRE FIEND

California Guardsman Says Stableman Drinking; Tells of Flames

PORTLAND, Feb. 12 (UP)—A strong clue to the identity of the person who started the disastrous fire in the stables of the Oakland horse show Sunday night was uncovered here today. Fred Peacock, a member of the California national guard, visiting here, said that a stableman, who was burned to death but has not been identified, accidentally started the blaze which claimed the lives of four men and 52 horses.

Considerable drinking went on among the stablemen at the show Sunday night, Peacock said. When the fire started, they tried to extinguish it themselves, instead of calling firemen stationed there.

Peacock said that he fought the fire in company with other national guardsmen and citizens. Working beside him was a cowboy, plainly intoxicated, called "Slim," "Bud" and "Jim," by various persons.

"This is where I threw a cigar a few minutes ago," Peacock said to the cowboy told him.

"I'll bet this started this whole thing," the youth said the horseman added after a few moments. The two were forced to leave the barn where they were fighting the flames, but a short time later, Peacock said, the cowboy entered the barn, saying he was going after one of the horses. He was never seen again.

Peacock said here that he didn't tell Oakland authorities about the affair "because they didn't ask me."

Attempts were being made to verify Peacock's story.

The states are Arizona, Colorado, Idaho, Iowa, Kansas, Missouri, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, New Mexico, Washington and Wyoming.

PENSION BILL IS DEFEATED

problem should certainly be discovered which would not overburden taxpayers.

Action of the house in defeating the old age pension bill today tended to increase the importance of Senator Eddy's measure. Now that the old age pension bill is defeated, it was pointed out, passage of Eddy's bill will probably postpone action on the pension measure until the next session of the legislature. At that time, it was said, the commission provided for in his bill would be able to present facts for a possible solution to the old age pension problem.

The senate unanimously passed Upton's measure authorizing drainage districts of 2,000 acres or less to waive payment of penalties of interest on delinquent assessments.

A house memorial, asking the national congress to appropriate funds for improvement of Shilcoos and Takenish lake lands in Lane and Douglas counties, also was passed.

A bill introduced by Senator Carsner would strengthen penalties provided for violation of the nickel slot machine law. Opponents of such contrivances would be subject to imprisonment for not less than six months or more than a year, or to a fine of no less than \$2,500 or more than \$1,000, or both.

A bill bearing the signatures of seven legislators—Andrews, Chiswick, Hamilton, Ellis, Root, Eberhard and Hall—would exempt from taxation all property given the state for public use on life state reserved to the donor.

A measure to regulate Deschutes county officer's salaries was reported on favorably by the senate committees on county and state offices. The measure will be read tomorrow for the third time. It was introduced by Hamilton, Schaupp and DeLap.

The tobacco tax bill was introduced in the house of representatives under the sponsorship of the joint ways and means committee.

The bill calls for a 10 per cent tax on all tobaccos, in any form, which must be paid by the wholesaler. The tax is expected to bring \$750,000 into the state general fund.

Average Airport Costs \$68,909 Figures Reveal

SALEM, Feb. 12 (UP)—A \$68,909 average investment is represented in each of Oregon's 22 commercial and municipal airports, according to a federal bureau of commerce survey.

The state has spent to date for airport construction, \$1,516,900.

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while \$235,000 was contemplated during the fiscal year of 1930-31 for additional construction and improvements, it was shown. Thus Oregon is in 19th place in highest expenditures contemplated during the period.

For municipal airport construction, \$205,900 was to be spent and only \$39,000 for commercial and private airport development. Of \$1,418,552 spent in airport

development since Oregon became "air-minded," \$751,729 represented land purchases, and \$138,378 was used for buildings. Other expenditures included equipment, land improvement, construction of

shops and draining. Only \$30,574 was spent for lighting equipment necessary to improve night flying. The state stood 20th in highest amount spent for those improvements.

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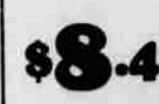
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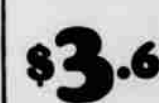
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
