BIG CONSUMERS

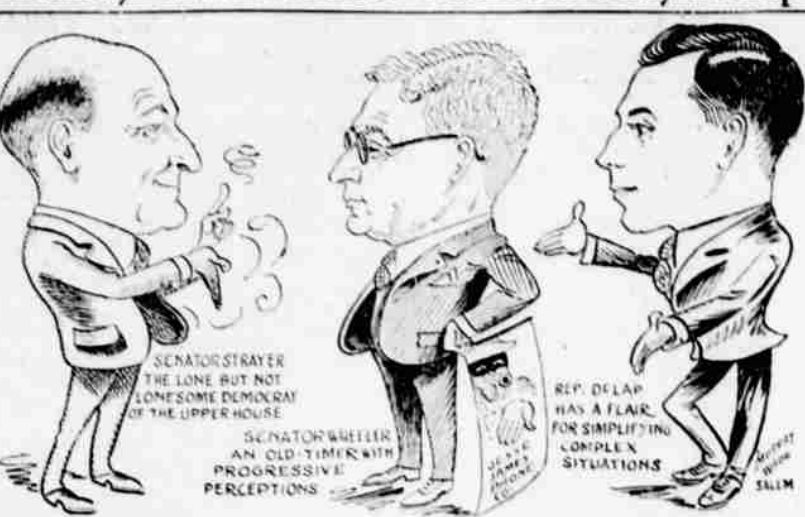
