

PILL TILDEN WINS FIRST PRO MATCH

Defeats Kozeluh Before Big Crowd in Spectacular Play in City

MADISON SQUARE GARDEN, NEW YORK, Feb. 18 (UP)—One of the most ancient tennis arguments was brought to an end temporarily at least tonight, when William T. Tilden II of Philadelphia, former dominant figure of the amateur game, bested Karel Kozeluh of Prague, Czechoslovakia, leading opponent of the professional game.

The scores in the first of their series of matches to determine the "world's indoor professional championship" were 6-1, 6-2, 6-4.

For years tennis experts have discussed the merits of Tilden's play along with that of Kozeluh and tonight Tilden showed himself superior to Europe's top flight professional just as he had been the master of the amateur ranks for a decade.

This was Tilden's first metropolitan appearance since he turned professional.

The match was played before a crowd of more than 10,000.

TILDEN TAKES PLAY
Tilden quickly took the play away from the wire Kozeluh, who won the first game on his own service but failed to win another until the fifth game. The play then followed the service until Tilden won until Tilden won the set at 6-4.

Tilden broke through Kozeluh's service to win the first game of the second set. Play followed service again until the fifth game which Tilden won against Kozeluh's serve, and then went on to win at 6-2.

SPECTACULAR MATCH
The play was highly spectacular. Tilden's famous cannonball serve stood him in excellent stead and was the most decisive feature of his play. He scored 14 service aces against five for Kozeluh. Kozeluh was guilty of three double faults and Tilden of none.

Many of the points won by Kozeluh came when Tilden repeatedly drove backhand shots into the net. In the first set especially, and also in the third set, Bill tried for gentle placements just over the tape only to see the ball fall short.

Tilden was much superior in his pace and tactics. Both men naturally play from the baseline and Tilden was well able to draw his opponent to the wrong corner. Kozeluh appeared to cover the court more effectively, but he had to use much more effort in doing so. He was definitely superior with his back hand play from the baseline.

Francis T. Hunter of New Rochelle, N. Y., and Emmet Pare of Dayton, Ohio, other former amateurs and now members of Jack Curley's professional troupe, cut short their three-set exhibition. Hunter won the first set 6-2, but they quit after the score of the second set stood at 5-5, to enable the main match to go on.

The attendance was officially announced as 14,000 and the receipts \$35,000.

Tilden and Hunter beat Kozeluh and Pare at doubles, 9-7, 6-4.

DISTRICT BOARD FOR MEMORIAL

Would Ask U. S. Senate To Pass McCormick Site Bill at Once

The board of directors of the Klamath Irrigation District yesterday voted to endorse a proposed memorial by the Oregon State Legislature to the United States senate calling upon that body for immediate passage of the McCormick site bill. The memorial will be subject to the need for it which Bert E. Haney, attorney for the district in the matter of the McCormick bill's passage, might see.

If Haney considers that such a memorial is needed to insure passage at this session of congress he shall notify State Representative Arthur Schaepp, who will introduce the memorial.

The board yesterday further voted to employ William Ganong, local attorney at a salary of \$150 a month as attorney for the district in the matter of delinquent foreclosures. It was stated that there is now delinquent about \$50,000 which is due. J. L. Jacob, director, stated that the district formerly paid five per cent on the amount foreclosed to the attorney.

The matter of the pumping rate on pumps of less than 100 horsepower was discussed before the board and a delegation for an association termed the Water User's Protective association.

Officials of the California Oregon Power company will meet with the board Saturday to further discuss the points brought up for the proposed arbitration agreement which will later be submitted to the voters of the district.
