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ARMY UNDER THE ABLE LEADERSHIP OF EUSTEN FORD

D. E. Alexander, owner of the DEEA ranches, gave members of the club some first hand information on what it costs to produce a beef steer and when his column of expenses on the steer were added and the market price established for the past three years, Rotarians readily found none of them want to enter the cattle business.

Mr. Alexander showed that a ton and a half of alfalfa hay at a production cost of \$9.84 in this valley is needed to run a steer. Added to this \$14.76 hay expense must be range and pasture, salt, vaccine, labor, interest and many other expenses which brings the cost of a two-year-old up to \$36.00 while the selling price is around \$100.

The speaker could paint no encouraging picture of the beef industry and plainly stated that the cost of operation is what troubles the industry. Even in these times competent labor is hard to get on a cow ranch and Mr. Alexander explained that the day of
