VALON, Santa Catalina Island, Calif., Feb. 20. (UP)—The 1931 prospects of the Chicago Cubs were brightened today by the appearance of Manager Rogers Hornsby at his old position at second base.

He went through 20 minutes of vigorous fielding practice with no apparent distress from the broken ankle or injured heel that kept him out of the lineup last season.

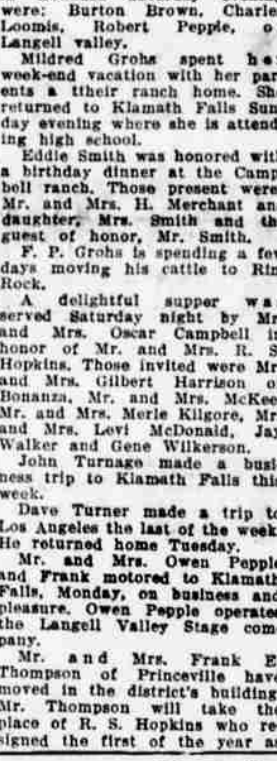

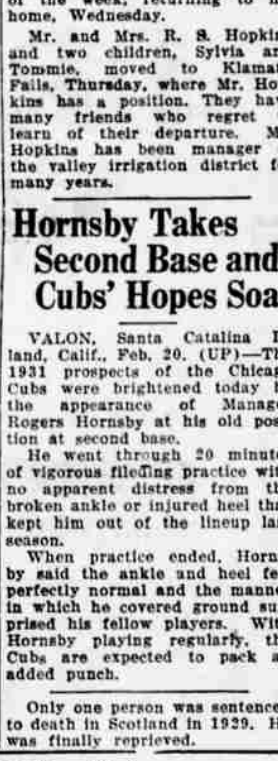

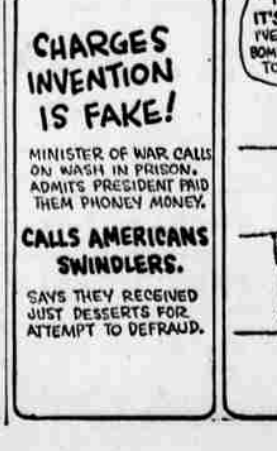
