

'DIME' ROW ENDS IN JAIL

Wife Accuses Silent Hubby, Tells of Desertion From Army

SEATTLE, Feb. 21. (UP)—Facing the possibility of losing her husband, all because of a dime, Mrs. Ruth Walton tonight wondered what she could do to have him released from the guard house at Fort Lawton.

Dan Walton was arrested when his wife told police that he had deserted the army. The betrayal occurred while the Waltons were in the midst of a hot argument over a dime.

It seemed that Walton had a dime in his pocket when he went to work yesterday, but when he returned home he told his wife he had walked to save the coin. She felt his coat, and although it had been raining, the garment was dry.

"He wouldn't give me a satisfactory explanation," she said. The argument was carried into the street, where she threatened to tell police he was a deserter. He told her to go ahead, and she did.

Dan was arrested and is held for court martial and the possibility of a two year term in prison if convicted.

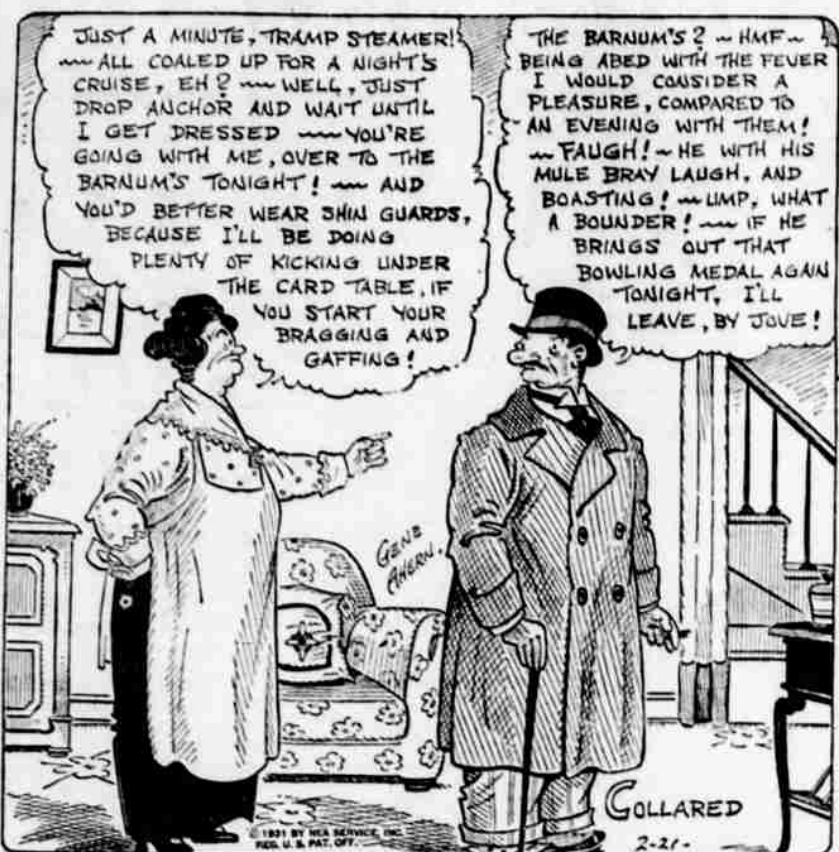
He abandoned army life at Fort Lewis a year and a half ago to marry Mrs. Walton, his wife declared.

Offers To Tell Of Robbery for Saving of Life

SEATTLE, Feb. 21 (UP)—Rivaling in effrontery the offer made by Al Capone, who offered to give up his labor racket if Chicago would give him an exclusive beer franchise, Harry T. Stone, alleged bank and train robber, today was understood to have volunteered to help authorities settle a train holdup investigation.

Stone, it was said, tentatively offered to confess participation in the \$52,000 robbery of a Southern Pacific mail train in California last fall if San Francisco officials will agree to forget that they want him for the killing of a policeman.

The alleged bandit's attorney, John Frank Garvin, and his nephew, Postoffice Inspector George Austin, whose investigations resulted in his arrest, were said to be on their way to San Francisco to dicker with authorities.

Stone is held in jail, recovering from a bullet wound he incurred when he resisted arrest several weeks ago.

Garvin declared that if Stone did talk, he would not implicate anybody else who participated in the train robbery. "If he makes a statement," the attorney said, "he will not be able to remember the names of other participants, what they looked like or what they did."

Twenty Horses Burn To Death In New York

NEW YORK, Feb. 22. (UP)—Twenty horses were burned to death early today in a fire that destroyed a one-story frame stable in Brooklyn.

Three alarms were turned in for the fire, which was discovered shortly before 1 o'clock. Sparks from the burning stable showered on the roofs of nearby tenement houses and 200 tenants were routed out by police as a precaution. They were soon permitted to return.

There were about 25 horses in the stable when the fire broke out but firemen and policemen were able to lead several of them out of the structure before they were injured by the flames.

Loss was estimated at between \$10,000 and \$25,000.

Care and protection for the racers in the major events has been given careful attention by the race committee and precaution is being taken that in case of accident or injuries on the trail the victim will receive aid and assistance at the earliest possible moment and will be speedily brought out to a doctor's care.

AID FOR ENTRANTS

At the carnival grounds two stations are established between the play grounds and Crater Lake Lodge, one at a point five miles from the play ground and the other at Anna Springs, five miles from the lodge. Three men will take care of the first station and will have first aid kits, hot soup, coffee, stimulants and ski grease ready to serve quickly to the racers.

The racers coming down from the lodge to Anna Springs will be carefully checked and if it happens that all runners are not accounted for in 35 minutes after leaving the lodge, a detail of two men with first aid and a toboggan will start back on the trail in search of the missing.
