

MODERNIZED HOME PLANS GIVE ROOM

Downstairs and Upstairs Can be Remodeled in Modern Lines

To tangle up the ancient adage, people who live in old houses should throw out some of the partitions.

Most older dwellings are cut up into small rooms which are out of keeping with modern design and convenience. Nothing will bring such dwellings up to date quicker than removing some of the partitions and giving the home fewer but more generously dimensioned rooms.

IN OLD HOUSES

Rearranging the partitions, however, does not always mean making rooms larger. For example, in older dwellings the kitchen usually takes up a great deal of floor space and yet contains less equipment than its smaller, modern counterpart. One corner of larger kitchens can frequently be partitioned off and converted into a breakfast room. Built-in equipment can then be installed in the remaining portion to make it more convenient and save the housewife many steps in the course of the average day.

A wide doorway or no doorway at all between dining and living rooms will often add to the attractiveness of a home's first floor. Such an arrangement makes a house seem more spacious and also makes cross-ventilation possible. Frequently the wall between the hallway and living room can also be removed, thus adding to the livable space. In this case, stairs can rise from one corner of the living room, another modern touch.

Mounting to the second floor, we find perhaps a large closet that can be converted into an additional bathroom or shower room. If there are a number of small bedrooms, two of them can be thrown together to make a master bedroom in the present day style.

It is unnecessary to say that careful planning should precede any effort to rearrange the partitions of a dwelling. FRANCE-ITALY ACCORD NEAR

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Other members of the delegation departed at 2 p. m. for Paris, bidding farewell to Grandi, naval minister Giuseppe Sirianni and other officials at the station. TO BE SUBMITTED

After their conversations at the Quai d'Orsay late Sunday, when final approval of the minor details of the accord is to be given, the agreement will be submitted to the governments of the United States, Japan, Great Britain and the British dominions, which were represented at the London conference. The British delegation will spend at least a day in Paris, although they consulted the Quai d'Orsay at length last night by telephone in regard to final arrangements.

The agreement will remove the immediate threat of a Franco-Italian naval construction which was believed likely otherwise to have developed into an armaments race between the two countries. It will permit both countries to adhere to the London treaty, although it was not believed likely that France and Italy would sign a separate agreement. The most authoritative sources believed that each country merely would adopt a definite building program through 1936, limiting categories of naval craft in close accordance with tonnage quotas previously suggested.

DETAILS SECRET

The details of the accord have not yet been made public, but they were understood to be approximately as follows:

1. Limitation of the French fleet to a figure of about 420,000 tons or 620,000, which is several hundred thousand tons less than demanded at the London conference.

2. Similar restrictions on the Italian navy so that France would continue to have superiority in tonnage, although it was not believed Italy had abandoned the principle of her demand for parity with France. The French superiority probably will be around 60,000 tons.

3. Abandonment of part of the French submarine building program, with restrictions on the plans of both France and Italy to build heavily in the under-water category. The French plans for 2,500 ton submarines of the type of the surcouf—probably the most formidable under-water craft ever built—will be radically changed or abandoned.

4. Prohibition for either France or Italy to transfer tonnage from one category to another.

Radio Stations Reduced After Control by U. S.

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 28 (UP)—From a peak figure of 722 before the Federal Radio commission took over control of American broadcasting four years ago, the number of radio stations in the United States dropped to 615 on January 1, 1931, according to reports received at the state house.

These and Canada's 70-odd stations, Cuba's 10, Mexico's 35 and a scattering few in Central America and the West Indies, bring North America's total to around 800—fully double the number of stations in all other countries of the world combined.

An Oregon automobile operator's license was issued to Shirley Mason, 630 Main street, Pendleton, Ore., on Oct. 31, 1930, and was numbered 549119. It gave her age as 26, height five feet and five inches, and weight 133 pounds; blond, gray eyes and occupation employee.

AGED 30 YEARS

Information gained by Deputy Coroner Joyaux from her personal effects revealed that she was born in Milwaukee, Wis., April 8, 1900, and was aged 30 years, 10 months and 23 days at the time of her death.

A note in a new testament in her trunk bore the inscription "Arrived home Feb. 17. Carl died Feb. 22, 1929."

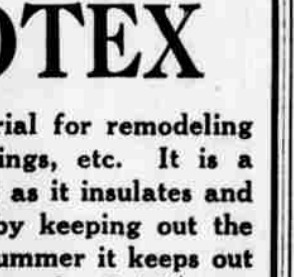

Mr. Paygr added that the persistent rumors have been discouraging some prospective settlers from locating in the district, and invites all those contemplating investments therein to confer with officials of the district if any doubt exists as to its general condition.

seed board, department of horticulture, dairy and food commissioner, while in Corvallis is the station registration board, state bacteriologist, state lime board and state chemist. All of the departments are to be consolidated into the new state office.

AGRICULTURE BOARD

CREATION of the new department caused revival of the old agriculture board. It is to consist of members representing all branches of the agricultural industry. They are:

HORTICULTURE, dairying, animal industry other than dairying, poultry industry, field crops, market gardening, agricultural cooperative marketing agencies. All members are to be appointed by the governor.

SPECIFICALLY provided in revisions to the original bill is that no activities of the state college concerning compilation of market outlook information or statistical crop outlooks are to be transferred from the college to the state department.
