

ALTURAS PLANS NEW AIRPORT

Landing Field Selected
Close to City Will
Accommodate All

ALTURAS, (Modoc Co.), Feb. 28.—The acquisition of an adequate airplane landing field here has been given considerable impetus by the sponsoring of the move by the Clifford Harter post of the American Legion of this place.

The old landing field used since 1920 and formerly owned by Modoc county, was abandoned last year on account of the sale of the land and is developed as a residential suburb of the city. The local legionnaires have taken a lease on the Laird estate property adjoining the city limits with an option to purchase the same. This tract, which is the largest piece of level land close to the city limits is stated by aviation experts to be admirable for airport purposes.

While it was used somewhat by army planes 10 years ago, it received its actual christening when Capt. F. S. Merriam, commander of the Floyd Bennett Aviation Post of the American Legion landed here with Pilot Nolan Bennett last Saturday to be the guest at a banquet tendered by the local post.

The new field, it is stated, will handle any size or type of plane.

Wood Products Used by Boys In Club Work

Thursday evening, Feb. 26, the Fairhaven 4-H Handicraft club held regular meeting in the workshop in the Fairhaven school. The first article to be made by each boy was a wooden salt box, a very useful article in the home. At this meeting, the 15 boys belonging to this club, had completed their boxes, and started work on a box to hold knives, forks and spoons. Their local leader is C. A. Tomlin and under his leadership the boys are doing splendid work. This is one of the finest clubs in the county and they are planning on completing their project before school is over in May.

They are also using a bulletin compiled by the Extension Service of the Oregon State college. One of the lumber firms donating lumber for making these articles is the Timber Products company, Chas. 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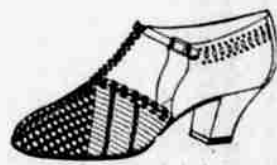

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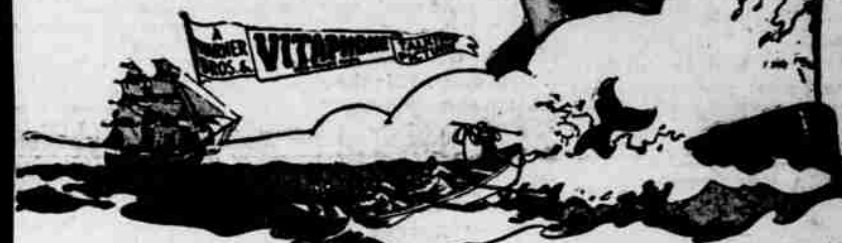
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
