

Railroad Fight Ends in Purchase Of B. M. E. Line

OKLAHOMA CITY, March 5. (UP)—A railroad fight of two years' duration was ended here tonight when the Missouri-Kansas-Texas Railway company announced it had purchased for \$1,850,000, the Beaver, Meade and Englewood railroad.

Of the purchase price \$350,000 was paid in cash. For two years, the M-K-T and Rock Island lines have been fighting for the route, which serves the southwest's richest wheat counties.

KLAMATH FOR SENATE BILL

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Grant site. County officials point out that the construction of the plant in Klamath and in this state will add to the taxable valuation, and would bring about \$50,000 in taxes to Klamath county annually.

CONFIDENCE EXPRESSED

A number of Klamath citizens plan to visit Governor Meier in Salem to express their approval of the measure and ask his early signing of the bill, it was learned last night.

They will point out the value of the investment to the county, the need for employment of workers which would be aided by the enactment of the bill and the additional income in taxes which would be given the county. Farmers will point out the assurance which the bill gives them of their prior rights to all water in the Klamath watershed for irrigation purposes.

LEGISLATURE NEARS CLOSE

PASS REAPPORTIONMENT
The senatorial reapportionment bill, which was brought in from the special committee on reapportionment late last night and which provides for no changes whatever in the distribution of representation in the upper house passed both houses of the Oregon legislature today.

The senate first approved the measure by a vote of 24 to 6, and later in the day the house signified its approval by a vote of 45 to 11, with four absent.

According to Senator Eberhard, the bill represented the views of the committee majority, as it had been impossible for the committee to work out any satisfactory changes in the short time available.

DUNNE OBJECTS
Senator Dunne objected to the bill because it was a "solidifying process on the part of some of the boys" who might be adversely affected by a real reapportionment.

"It looks like this senate has not got the nerve to do the right thing," Dunne declared, in pointing out that senatorial reapportionment would be blocked for the next 10 years if the measure passed.

The prison improvement measure, which provides for the appropriation of \$146,500 in an attempt to repair the state penitentiary so that it will be fireproof and safe for the inmates, was approved unanimously by the house.

KILL PRIMARY CHANGE
The house killed a measure which sought to change the primary election date from May to August on every other election year.

Farmers were the chief objectors to the bill, when they contended that they were too busy in August to go to the polls.

The senate approved an interim committee to study chain stores operating in Oregon. County surveyors and assistants engaged in hazardous occupations were placed under the workmen's compensation act by another measure which passed the senate.

APPROVE BUDGET
After debating for two hours on the budget of the state board of higher education calling for a total of \$1,181,173 in appropriations, the upper house passed the measure by a vote of 21 to 9.

The following appropriations were approved by both houses of the legislature and sent to Governor Meier for his signature: State penitentiary, \$618,450; state industrial school for girls, \$177,504; state training school, \$126,358; school for deaf, \$141,135; school for blind, \$52,326; eastern Oregon state hospital, \$590,241; state hospital in Salem, \$1,037,393; Oregon soldiers' home, \$89,577; state tubercular hospital, \$276,707; eastern Oregon tuberculosis hospital, \$205,405; state printing board, \$23,100; blue book, \$5,000; soldiers' and sailors' commission, \$2,500; bureau of labor and state welfare commission, \$24,180.

Depression To Disappear Under Colors

NEW YORK, March 5. (UP)—If there is anything, as some people assert, in the psychology of colors, all of America's depression will disappear under the glad influence of violent cerise reds, emerald greens and blue laces in which women are to clothe themselves this spring and summer.

Buyers from the middle west, gathering to listen to Mrs. Deasie M. Barr, of the Fashion coordination bureau, who has just returned from Paris, discovered the importance of color in Mrs. Barr's parade of models and display of accessories.

"The skirt length remains where it has been for two years," said Mrs. Barr. "Sports clothes should be from three to five inches below the knee; street costumes from seven to eight inches below the knee; evening gowns from ankle length to the floor."

Many of the costumes shown were of sheer woolen material, much affected by foreign couturiers, in new blues and browns. Patent leather belts were much in favor, and tiny checks appeared very smart.

The new war policies commission, seeking to take the profit out of war, held its first hearing. Heads of veterans organizations spoke for a "universal draft." Financiers and others will testify in the next 10 days. Congress voted \$50,000 for the inquiry.

Chairman Alexander Legge of the farm board issued a new warning for reduction of cotton acreage and planting of food crops. Some who have been doing this "aren't on the Red Cross charity list today," said Legge, who refused to say whether or not he has resigned.

President Hoover still has about 20 bills left from the expired congress. He expects to act on them within the constitutional 10 days.
