

SNOW DRIFTS NEAR CRATER

**Klamath Rainfall Below
Normal Despite New
Rains Lately**

Piling the snow in drifts from 12 to 20 feet deep, and sweeping the ground almost bare in other spots, a raging blizzard has been in progress at the rim of Crater Lake for the past three days.

Although only 10 or 11 inches of snow have fallen during this period of time, there has been no let up in the gale. The snow on the level measures six and one half feet deep, according to the park ranger, which amount is about three and one half feet less than the normal depth for this season.

In spite of the howling wind, the mercury has fallen no lower than 30 degrees during the past three days, the ranger said.

According to statistics compiled at the weather bureau of the United States Reclamation service, there is little snow in the mountains at this time, and little can be expected of this season, as there is no frost in the ground, and the snow and ice sweep into the ground as they melt, leaving no surplus for run-off. Some mountain ranger stations have reported as much as 18 to 20 inches of snow and ice, but this amount is far below normal, and will go out so slowly that little good will be accomplished.

Precipitation in Klamath county so far in March is 43 per cent below normal, with only .43 of an inch registered so far. In February .52 of an inch of precipitation was recorded, which amount was 61 per cent of normal. January was very low, registering only 29 per cent of the normal amount of precipitation, with .56 of an inch of rainfall recorded.

Total precipitation for the year is less than half of what the normal amount should be, according to the U. S. bureau. This total shortage is based upon statistics for the stream year, beginning October 1.

Sister Bonosa Dies Thursday In Pendleton

Word of the death of Sister Mary Bonosa, for several years the superior of the Sacred Heart Academy until ill health caused her to leave this city, reached Klamath Falls Thursday. Sister Bonosa died yesterday at a Pendleton hospital, where she had been confined for some time. Her death terminating a lengthy and serious illness.

A requiem mass for the repose of her soul will be said at Sacred Heart church at 9 o'clock Friday morning, at the same hour as the funeral service will be held in Pendleton. Reverend F. L. Gies will be celebrant of the requiem mass, to which the public is invited. The Sacred Heart choir will also participate.

Sister Bonosa came to Klamath Falls in 1924 to take charge of the Sacred Heart Academy. Last year she was appointed to Baker, but was unable to get farther than Pendleton because of ill health. Her condition had been critical for several weeks. She was a direct sixth generation of French Canadian origin, a firm faith and a convert of the Catholic church.

Young Men Held Up, Robbed On Highway Here

Two young men, Art Minor and Ernest Root, were boldly held up by two bandits with a gun on the Ashland-Klamath Falls highway near McCollum's mill about 4:40 Wednesday afternoon.

Minor and Root, enroute to Klamath Falls, were driving an open touring car. They were overtaken by a Model A Ford roadster, which horned as it passed, but instead, pulled ahead of Minor and Root's car and forced them to stop.

Two unmasked bandits with a gun ordered the young men to "stick 'em up," and robbed the pair of \$155 in cash. A suitcase containing clothing valued at more than \$175 was also taken from Minor and Root.

After looting the young men's automobile, the bandits departed toward Klamath Falls, ordering their victims not to move for 45 minutes.

Minor and Root were unable to distinguish the license number on the robbers' car, as it was obscured by mud.

The daring robbery was reported to Klamath Falls police headquarters as well as the sheriff's office as soon as young men arrived in town. They described the "stick up men" to authorities. One of the bandits was described as being about five feet nine inches tall and weighing 145 pounds, with dark hair and sideburns; the other was a little taller and heavier, with fair complexion, and wore blue overalls and jumper.

Officers are working on this case, information today in hopes of tracing the bandits.

LEU FOOK SAYS CHARGE UNTRUE

**Denies Killing Employer
And Contradicts
Manager Grant**

SAN FRANCISCO, March 12. (UPI)—Leu Fook, the first Chinese servant ever tried in San Francisco on a charge of murdering an American employer, testified in his own defense through an interpreter here today.

Leu denied that he had killed Mrs. Rosetta Baker, club woman and actress, but became more excited in contradicting the testimony of Mrs. Baker's business manager, Lincoln U. Grant, who had been called just before him by his own attorneys.

MANY ARGUMENTS
During direct examination of Grant by Defense Attorney James M. Hanley, Judge L. L. Harris had to settle many arguments between opposing counsel and once said: "I'll give every latitude, Mr. Hanley, to show that this crime was done by someone outside of Leu Fook, but it must be competent and it must be relevant."

Hanley had asked Grant whether he proposed marriage to Mrs. Baker before he was divorced from his wife, and had received an emphatic "no" in reply.

CONTRADICTS GRANT
He then denied that two weeks before the homicide he had tried to enter Mrs. Baker's apartment from a side entrance, was asked by Leu to explain why he did not go to the front door, and explained to the servant he did not wish to be seen by Walter Middleton Outler, an actor, whom he believed to be visiting her.

The Chinese houseboy started his testimony by claiming the incident had really happened. Then he said by testimony by Grant that the business manager did not have a pass key to Mrs. Baker's apartment was incorrect.

"Mr. Grant did have such a pass key, Leu declared.

Other keys were held, he said, by himself, Mrs. Baker, and her housekeeper, Mrs. Rae Dix.

REBUKED HOUSEKEEPER
He denied he had ever prophesied to Mrs. Dix that Mrs. Baker would be murdered, and testified he had once rebuked Mrs. Dix for criticizing his employer for "going with young fellows and buying liquor for them to drink."

"I told her I didn't like to hear her say those things of Mrs. Baker," he said.

Grant testified that the night Mrs. Baker was strangled to death he was in the Berkeley apartment of Mrs. Lorraine Ward. This was

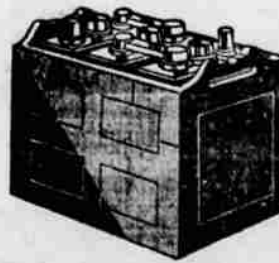
