Mr. and Mrs. Byron Welch of Bonanza, accompanied by Marvin and Esther Michael, spent Tuesday afternoon at Chiloquin.

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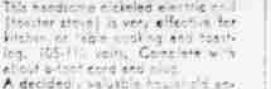

Modern Science Can Prevent Much Disease

SALEM, March 12. (UP)—

Infantile paralysis and tuberculosis of the bone are responsible for more than half of all present day cripples, according to Jacob S. Engel, president of the Pennsylvania Society for Crippled Children.

Engel is touring the west. From 33 to 40 per cent of the cripples are left with their physical handicaps by infantile paralysis, while tuberculosis of the bone contributes from 18 to 22 per cent, Engel said.

Engel urges each state to take prompt action in cases of partial paralysis. He said 60 per cent of crippled children's troubles can be prevented by modern science.
